SALEM, March 19 (AP)—The Seattle Stars and Portland Eagles will meet in the Rose City this Friday night in the seventh and deciding game of the northern division, Pacific Coast Hockey league, semi-final playoffs for the right to meet the Seattle Ironmen in a title series opening Sunday.
