

LOCKSMEN TO DISPLAY BRAND IN ALL TRUCKS

Locksmen operating on or entering the Klamath Indian reservation must in the future have their trucks equipped with a display of their respective brands. The markings must be illuminated at night so that they are easily discernible and easily patrolled by the officers patrolling the reservation.

Movements of livestock trucks and other livestock conveyances on the increase, it is found, the reservation which has prompted the inauguration of an active campaign on the part of the officers to prevent illegal operations, especially those leading to "black market" sales.

Contractors are also urged to see to it in the future that their animals are given clean bills of health by a licensed veterinarian before going to the reservation, whether the animals be cattle, sheep, or bulls brought on for breeding purposes.

Appropriate warnings have been posted and mailed regarding these requirements and it is urged strictly to enforce the concerning all movements of livestock, officials said. Inspections, permits will be carefully examined, the agency announced.
