CONSTRUCTION OF DAM GETS APPROVAL

WALLA WALLA, March 22 (AP)—Reclamation officials from Oregon, Washington and Idaho were in almost unanimous agreement yesterday that construction of the Umatilla (McNary) dam to provide a pool elevation of 340 feet above sea level is both feasible and desirable.

The project was contained in the rivers and harbors bill passed last month and signed by the president.

Only objections came from delegations of Indians from the Yakima and Umatilla reservations and from C. L. Anderson of Seattle, assistant director of fisheries for Washington state, who represented Milo Moore, fisheries director.

Others favored the project from standpoints of navigation, flood control, irrigation and power. It was pointed out that a dam higher than 340 feet would seriously disturb the cities of Kennewick, Pasco and Richland, but that the highest dam found feasible by army engineers should be constructed.

Governor Warren's tax reduction proposal until other issues have been fought out or bring the administration bill to a roll call.

Warren men gained an advantageous position when they succeeded in amending the Four bill so that Legislative Counsel Fred Wood ruled it required only a flat majority of 41 votes rather than 54, or two-thirds majority, for passage.

Assemblyman Don Field, chairman of the republican assembly caucus which decided to give the measure consideration in a committee of the whole house, said the bill would be called up today.

A previous roll call appeared to indicate the administration has a minimum of 44 votes, or three more than needed to pass the bill and send it to the senate, which postponed action on comparison measures until April 13.

Farm organizations lost an effort to return to California to standard time when the assembly governmental and efficiency committee tabled Assemblyman Sam Heisinger's bill to end war time on the ground it hampers farm work and increases the hazard to school children in the winter months. The changeback was opposed by railroad representatives, who told the committee confusion would result in railroading if California got out of line with other states.

Governor Warren in a speech to the State Supervisors' association urged the county officials not to face possible loss of autonomy by accepting state subsidies which could eventually be expected to lead to state control of county affairs. He declared the states have lost much freedom of action, prestige and dignity, through having run to the federal government for financial assistance. He also reiterated his belief there is no need for raising state taxes and declared California's total tax burden, which he placed at four and a quarter billion, federal, state, county and city, is all that can be borne.

Home Dem Office Has Can Supply

In addition to bulletins on homemaking subjects the Home Demonstration office in the federal building has a supply of prepared cans.

These cans are ready to be filled at home with food for men overseas. Fudge may be poured right into the cans and fruit cake baked in them. When they are filled they may be brought back to the office and sealed properly to be sent overseas.

KREMLIN-VATICAN LINK PROPOSED

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—Edward J. Flynn is believed to be exploring for President Roosevelt the possibility of an ultimate closer relationship between the Vatican and the Kremlin.

The Bronx political leader's arrival in Italy from Russia was announced yesterday at Rome, although the exact nature of his mission remains an official mystery. The White House has had nothing to say of it beyond the disclosure that Mr. Roosevelt invited his "old friend" to accompany him to the Yalta Big Three conference when he learned Flynn was planning a trip to Moscow.

However, there is a well-founded speculation in diplomatic quarters that Flynn's travels represent one of the most delicate diplomatic moves ever undertaken by Mr. Roosevelt: an effort to bridge the gap which separates soviet Russia and the temporal state of the Roman Catholic church.

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CEILING PRICES HELD CAUSE OF MEAT SHORTAGE

Ceiling prices which make slaughter unprofitable were declared to be one reason for meat shortage here, at a conference held with packing house people by the civic affairs committee of the chamber of commerce.

County Meat Inspector Dr. Calvin Hunt, E. B. Hall, chairman of the city health committee, and meat packers discussed the possible meat shortage facing this area with the committee on civic and military affairs.

It was discovered that 100 per cent of 1944's slaughter on beef, veal and sheep will be allowed, but only 50 per cent of pork. Packers stated that lack of cattle locally is causing the meat shortage here. Cattle growers are losing interest on account of the ceiling price on fattened cattle, and high cost of feed, it was stated.

Packing houses may not slaughter up to their full quota allowed because the cost of shipping animals for slaughter here from other sources is prohibitive, in relation to meat prices set by the OPA, it was claimed.

The civic and military affairs committee decided to make a canvass of slaughter houses to see if they are planning to slaughter their full quota this year. If they are not planning to do so, on account of shipping costs, plans will be discussed to enable them to get their supply by some means.

If all the packing plants are planning to use their full quota, these figures will be checked against population figures for this area, and if insufficient, some means of increasing the quota will be discussed.

Ed Johnson of the Johnson Packing company was given a much reduced slaughter quota from regular years, because of his plant being closed down much of the comparable period of last year for remodeling operations. His quota, based on last year's figures which were short of usual operations, will make a difference in the meat supply this year unless these figures can be changed to correspond

The Western front: American reduced German hold west of Rhine to mere bridgehead; Ludwigschafen entered; Neuenkirchen, Ustade taken; Yanks fought inside Mainz; Rhine-Moselle-Saar offensive may have cost enemy more than 100,000 casualties; Remagen bridgehead broadened with tank support; Germans fled Ruhr as allied armies massed for push.

The Russian front: Lull settled over front east of Berlin; red army wedged six miles from Danzig; East Prussian pocket lashed furiously as battle southwest of Koenigsberg was reported drawing to a close.

The Italian front: Artillery hammered German strongpoints; patrolling continued.

The Pacific front: Success of attacks on enemy homeland island portended speed-up of non-stop blows against Japanese empire; organized resistance crushed in Panay; Shimbu line east of Manila collapsed; Cavite province virtually cleared; Zamboanga harbor sector on Mindanao cleared; airfields in operation without enemy hindrance. Superforts bombed Rangoon areas.
