Koiso Begg Japs To Defend Nation

SAN FRANCISCO, March 22 (AP)—Premier Kuniaki Koiso of Japan told his countrymen today the loss of Iwo Jima to the American marines "is the most unfortunate thing in the whole war situation," and again warned against a United States invasion of the Nipponese homeland.

Koiso, in a Tokyo domestic broadcast heard by the FCC, said the Americans had "numerical superiority" and appealed to the Japanese to exhibit a "burning determination to defend the nation."

WAR CASUALTIES MOUNT IN NUMBER

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—Army and navy combat casualties since the beginning of the war reached 859,587, the two services reported today.

Undersecretary of War Patterson reported army losses of 767,680 on the basis of names compiled in Washington through March 14. The navy sets its toll at 91,907.

The combined total was an increase of 10,998 over last week's report.

A breakdown on army casualties and corresponding figures for last week:

Killed, 159,310 and 145,733; wounded, 464,731 and 450,760; missing, 88,209 and 89,656; prisoners, 64,430 and 62,302. Of the wounded, 236,251, or more than half, have returned to duty.

Similar figures on navy casualties:

Killed, 35,342 and 34,938; wounded, 41,882 and 41,443; missing, 10,417 and 10,483; prisoners, 4,266 and 4,260.
