Telegram Brings Renewed Hope of PFC Neil Mayfield

A telegram received March 20 brought new hope of PFC Neil W. Mayfield, reported missing January 8, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Mayfield of 2043 Hope, and to his sister to whom the wire was addressed.

The telegram received by Mrs. L. A. Johnson of 2154 Arthur, stated as follows:

"The following enemy propaganda broadcast from Germany has been intercepted. Hello Sis. I am fine, don't worry. Notify the folks. Hope to see you soon. Love, Neil." Pending further confirmation this report does not establish his status as a prisoner of war. Additional information received will be furnished.

"Larch, Provost marshal general."

Mrs. Mayfield said the telegram was sent to her daughter as they had moved and Neil did not know their address.

In the last letter received from Mayfield he said he had not heard from his parents since November.

Mayfield landed overseas December 18, 1944, and was in combat service from December 27 to January 8, 1945, since which time he was reported missing.

The telegram notifying his parents was received the end of January.

DEADLINE SET ON CROP INSURANCE

Federal crop insurance for this year's wheat is available to Klamath county farmers only if 50 or more applications are made before April 1.

A deadline has been set as of that date and no more applications can be accepted after that time for this year's insurance program.

Applications will be accepted at the local AAA offices in the Federal building and full information on the program can be obtained there.

Premium rates are fixed at 1.5 bushels per acre for 75% coverage and .6 bushels per acre for 50% coverage on a yield fixed for each farm.
