Principal women who have addressed the clubs have been Mrs. Donald F. McKay, Mrs. Twyla Ferguson and Mrs. E. K. Lookey, while Mrs. E. A. Geary has been in charge of radio addresses.

Among the organizations who have been addressed, or who will be furnished with speakers are the Business and Professional Women, both chapters of PEO, the Women's auxiliary of St. Paul's church, Council of Churches and the Venture club. It is the earnest desire of the members of the League that no one shall lack an opportunity of obtaining information on these proposals.

The local League board was instructed to request that the state League provide funds for their budget by a per capita assessment on the various chapters throughout the state. The April meeting will be given over to the election of officers.
