

SNELL SIGNS BILLS AIDING WAR VETERANS

SALEM, March 26 (P)—Bills to provide farm and home loans and educational benefits for veterans were signed into law today by Governor Earl Snell, who said that the new laws place Oregon in the "forefront among the states in services and benefits provided for members of the armed forces."

One of the bills, house bill 421, provides that veterans may be given farm and home loans up to \$3000, but not more than 75 per cent of the value of the property. The loans would carry 4 per cent interest, and be amortized over 20 years. These loans will be administered by the newly-created state department of veterans affairs.

The loans will be financed by a 1 mill property tax approved by the voters at the general election last November. This tax will raise \$1,000,000 a year.

The other measure, house bill 347, amends the measure approved at the November election, to provide educational benefits. It provides a wider choice of schools and colleges, and reduces the amount of benefits.

The benefits will be \$35 a month for each of four school years. The measure passed last November provided for \$75 the first month, \$50 for the next eight months, and \$35 for each month of the next three school years.

Both measures prevent veterans from obtaining benefits both from the federal and state governments.

Governor Snell said "I wish to commend the members of the legislature for adopting this part of my program by practically a unanimous vote."

The governor also signed 23 other bills today, leaving only about 75 on which he still must take action.

He signed house bill 212, which sets up the machinery for counties to adopt the county manager form of government, and 11 appropriation bills.

Other measures signed today include:

HB136—Allowing counties to grant a maximum of 12 days a year in vacations and sick leaves to employees.

HB388—Providing a short form for income tax returns for persons earning less than \$5000 a year.

SB103—Providing for uniform salaries for district attorneys, and increasing salaries of two-thirds of them.

SB186—Increases salaries of circuit judges to \$6000 a year. They now get from \$5000 to \$6000, depending on population of their districts.

Diphtheria Cases Now Number 48

MOLALLA, March 26 (P)—Diphtheria cases in the epidemic which has swept over this town since last week had reached 48 today—an increase of two over the weekend, Dr. Dan P. Trullinger, county health officer, reported.

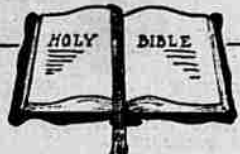
Diphtheria immunization shots were given to 107 persons from Molalla and nine neighboring communities Saturday in the courthouse.

The list of those stricken includes about 28 families, with five cases in one family. Ages of the diphtheria sufferers range from 3 to 60 years.

Appearing before Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney Saturday morning, Durand entered a plea of guilty, was fined \$100 and costs, and his sentence of 30 days in the county jail suspended.

Warren Men Will Attempt To Strip Rider From Tax Bill

SACRAMENTO, March 26 (P)—A sizable portion of Governor Warren's legislative program was at the crossroads in the legislature today. Upon the ability of his forces to poll 41 votes for a reconsideration depended the fate of the administration's efforts to strip from the tax reduction bill a rider which wrote into it a provision for setting aside \$57,000,000 for future appropriation to cities and counties for postwar spending.

The amendment commits the bill to the principle of subsidies to local governmental divisions,

which the governor has opposed. It provides that whether taxes are kept on the 1943 reduced level, upped or lowered, fractions of the sales, corporation income and bank and corporation taxes, the \$57,000,000 will be earmarked for local use. There has been no legislation yet to require matching of state funds with local funds.

Only the two issues, tax reduction and subsidies, are tied together by the assembly's action on a 41 to 39 roll call Friday, but health insurance has been indirectly tied in by the declaration of Domestic Floor Leader Robertson that passage of the tax bill and its subsidy rider precludes enactment of any health bill.

DISCHARGED VETS GET 2 SHOE STAMPS

Ration books issued to discharged servicemen hereafter will contain two valid shoe stamps instead of the single stamp ordinarily allowed, according to M. R. Collins, district OPA shoe rationing representative.

Granting discharged servicemen the use of two regular shoe ration stamps is part of the program to adjust OPA regulations to assist veterans in their return to civilian life. Local boards have been advised that the new ruling applies to all books issued to veterans after March 26, 1945.

When a veteran comes out of the service, he either has no shoe stamp at all, or a book from which all the shoe stamps have been removed on issuance to military personnel. The government issue shoes he owns usually are not suitable for civilian wear, and he generally

finds that the shoes he wore before going into the service no longer fit.

The shoe ration program provides that anyone who needs shoes and has less than two pairs that are wearable or repairable, may get an extra ration in the form of a special shoe stamp issued by the local board. However, under the exception being made for shoe stamps issued to discharged servicemen, two pairs will be available immediately, without the necessity of making separate application to the board for the second pair.

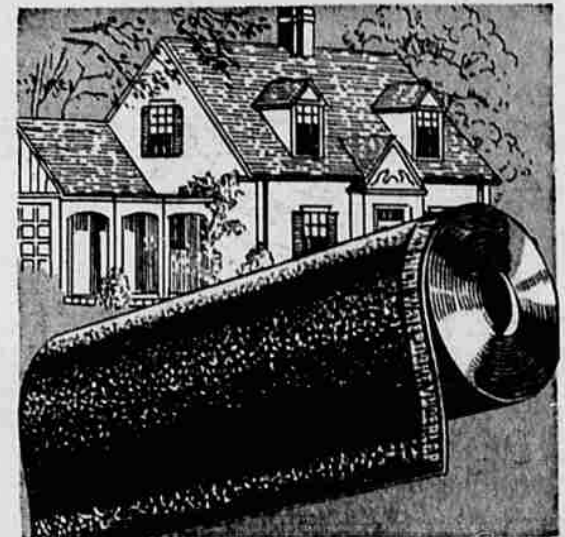

Smith, president of Willamette Iron and Steel corporation, succumbed yesterday to complications of pneumonia and heart ailments.

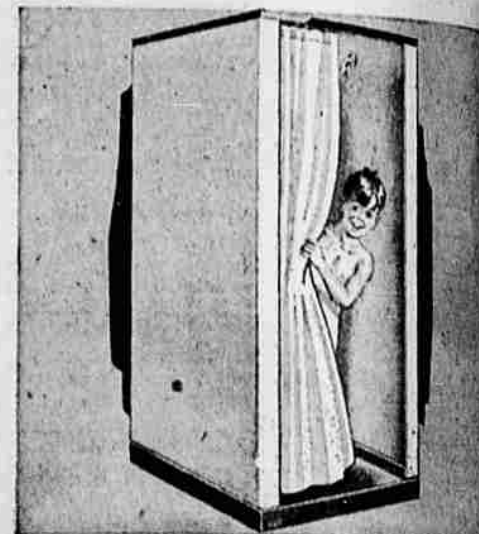
He was born at Bureau, December 1, 1866, and was educated in Portland public schools.

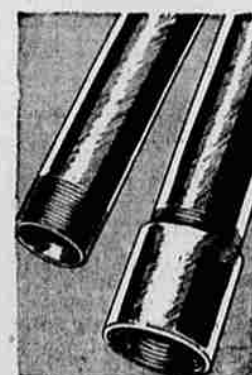
