Williams Ko's DePaul's Demons Bounce Lay in Third Bowling Green, 71-54

Oklahoma Aggies Tangle With New York Tonight in Finals of NCAA Tilt.

NEW YORK, March 27 (AP)—DePaul's Demons from Chicago finally licked their New York basketball tournament jinx. Coach Ray Meyer's quintet from the Windy City snared the national invitation title by crushing Bowling Green, 71 to 54, in last night's final before 18,168 at Madison Square Garden.

Last year the Demons reached the final, but lost to St. John's in an upset. Two years ago Georgetown whipped them in the eastern NCAA competition. For a time it seemed the jinx would again ruin George Mikán and company. Ten-point favorites before the opening tossup, DePaul appeared behind the eight-ball when Bowling Green rushed into an early 12-point lead at 13-1.

But big George, later picked as the outstanding player of the tourney with 120 points in three games, started to find the range, ably assisted by Whitey Kachan's pass interceptions. Within a few minutes DePaul had pulled up to tie at 20-20 and then lead, 30 to 22, at halftime. Bowling Green never was able to catch up.

Altogether Mikán tossed in 34 points on 15 field goals and four free throws. He outplayed the 6'11" Don Otten who sparked the Ohioans to their early lead, although it was Don Whitehead with 17 points who did the most scoring for B. G. After a celebration in their hotel headquarters, Coach Meyer took the DePaul players on an early morning stroll along cur-

Branch Rickey, president of the Dodgers, announced today that he telephoned to Galan in Berkeley, Calif., from the Dodgers' camp at Bear Mountain.

"Galan told me that he is so busy in his butcher shop that he would be unable to leave until April 2," Rickey said. "I asked him if he would be willing to play first base if Manager Leo Durocher assigned him to that position. He said he would report ready and willing to play first base in 154 games. He also informed me that he has been working out with the San Francisco club two hours a day so he should be well advanced in training when he reports."

ITHACA, N. Y., March 27 (AP)—If Smilin' Ed McKeever's first impressions mean anything, Cornell university may have to introduce an innovation next fall—"Co-man" football.
