Governor Earl Snell this week announced the reappointment of Walter Wiesendanger of Klamath Falls to serve during 1945 as Klamath county chairman of Keep Oregon Green, and has asked the new chairman to select at once a strong committee of citizens to work with him in the all-important work of preventing farm and forest fires this year.

"As the war draws to a close," Governor Snell stated, "we can expect desperate last minute efforts to wreak their spite on us. Such fiendishness might take the form of incendiary attacks on our forests. We must be ever on the alert to make certain that such attacks fail."

Charles Ogle, newly named executive secretary, stated at Salem headquarters of KOG this week that he would very shortly start on a tour of the state to work out local fire prevention programs with each county committee.

The proposed cooperative district would be supplied by water pumped from the Columbia river or four wells drilled near the river bank. The latter is favored because it would supply water for domestic use.

to Work—Wallace Watson, the reclamation office underwent a minor operation last week, returned to work.

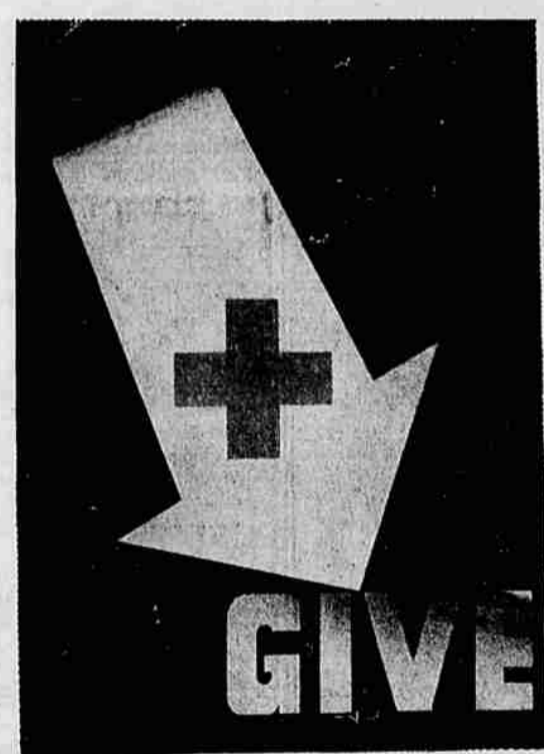
