

California Assembly Launches Discussion On Health Insurance

SACRAMENTO, March 22 (AP)—With tax reduction and subsidies for cities and counties temporarily bypassed, health insurance dominated legislative interest today.

Launched upon their inescapably stormy courses in the assembly at a protracted and controversial hearing by the public health committee lasting until a

late hour last night, both the governor's and the CIO compulsory measures drew the fire of critics but were defended by their supporters as feasible, workable plans.

Health insurance will work, because it is working, Prof. Samuel C. May, research director of the University of California told the committee, chairmanship by Assemblyman Frederick H. Kraft (R), San Diego.

He declared sentiment among British physicians has swung from bitter opposition to enthusiastic support of the plan which has been in operation for years in England and said he would submit for the record a letter from the secretary of the British Medical association to that effect.

Dr. Nathan Sinal, who 30 years ago took his degree as a doctor of veterinary medicine and then turned to health services to eventually become professor of public health at the University of Michigan, testified the financing proposed in the Warren bill is adequate "within the limits" of the services proposed in the bill.

Professor May termed the estimate of Rolland Vendergrift, legislative budget advisor, that the Warren plan would cost the state \$100,000,000 a year "absurd."

The benefits contemplated in both the Warren and the CIO bills, he said, will be well under the \$26.50 per person which will be available from the 3 per cent payroll contributions. In order to have a deficit, he testified, it would be necessary to exceed this amount by \$20 a person for the 3,000,000 plus workers and dependents who will be subject to benefits.

"The 3 per cent," he said, "will be more than ample, even if we are forced to operate during a severe depression."

SNELL COMING FOR CHAMBER MEET IN APRIL

Groesbeck also suggested that steps be taken to provide a light cinder surface or other light coating to unpaved city streets, in order to bring about more cleanliness on streets in general.

The directors ordered a letter sent to Colonel George O. Van Orden expressing appreciation of the chamber to him, his officers and men, for cooperation in connection with the forum dinner held last Friday evening.

Circuit Judge Charles H. Combs of Lakeview was here today to hear the damage case of Hannon vs. Larkey et al.

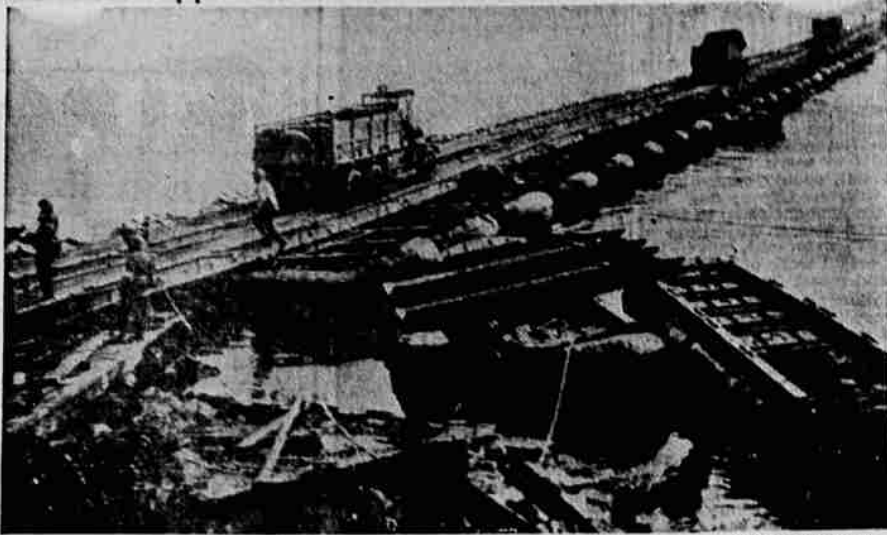
