

CROSS WAR AND CAMPAIGN BELOW QUOTA

an Ashley, chairman of the Cross war fund drive, announced that at the meeting of the various drive committees, it was indicated that contributions are not coming as quickly as they should. Ashley said that he has not remitted them as yet, but is reaching the \$64,000 for Klamath county.

Contributions to the war fund reached approximately \$20,000, with still nearly \$20,000 to go to reach the goal by Friday, March 31. About \$10,000 has been pledged, but has come in yet.

Applications must be MAILED in to War Price and Rationing Board at Main street, and NOT presented in person.
CESSED FOODS:
RIF STAMPS—Ration book 4—Blue stamps X-5 through B-2 valid through June 31. Blue stamps C-2 through G-2 through April 28. Blue stamps through M-2 valid through June 2. stamps N-2 through S-2 valid through June 30.
RIF STAMPS—Ration book 4—Red stamps Q-3 through B-5 valid through June 31. Red stamps T-3 through X-3 through April 28. Red stamps through D-2 valid through June 2. stamps K-2 through J-2 valid through June 30.
RIF STAMPS—Ration book 4—Sugar stamp valid through June 2.
COINS—Ration book 3—Airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 now valid. Loose coins are invalid.
COUPONS: "A" 14 coupons, 4 gal-each, valid through March 21. 15 coupons, 4 gallons each, valid through June 21.
WAGES: Apply local board for all wage certificates.
COAL, COAL, SAWDUST: Dealer delivery, priority from consumer's written statement of annual and quantity on hand.

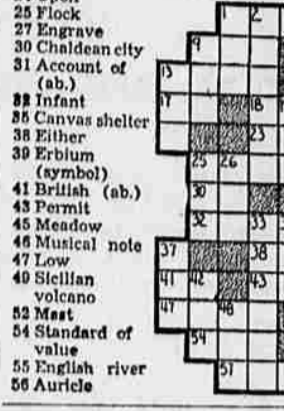

Tin Still Urgently Needed In County Salvage Drive

The county central salvage committee met Monday in the Pelican cafe to discuss the salvage program.

It was disclosed at the luncheon that additional quantities of tin are needed for the completion of a railroad carload. Paul Lee, county salvage chairman, urged that anyone having tin to bring it in to the salvage depot, 606 Market, so that the car may be filled and shipped immediately.

Approximately 80 tons of paper were collected in the kick-off drive Sunday. This week is the kick-off for waste fat salvage, but a house-to-house canvass will not be made. Housewives are requested to turn their waste fats in to the butcher where they will be reimbursed with cash and red points. The central salvage depot is

open 24 hours a day for the convenience of the citizens of Klamath county. As soon as waste material is accumulated, it should be brought to the depot so that shipments may be kept rolling, Lee stated.

These kick-off drives, Lee said, are just the beginning of the organized salvage program which will continue as long as waste materials are needed in the war effort.

RECLAMATION HEADS TO MEET IN APRIL

State, federal and local reclamation officials will assemble in Spokane April 3 to set the date for the reclamation district elections to decide further development and repayment of federal contracts on the Columbia basin development, Art Garton, state director of conservation and development, reported yesterday.

Garton said the site was selected as a convenience for federal officials now in the northwest who wish to attend the session. Elsewhere in the northwest the proposed establishment of the Columbia valley authority received the backing of the Grand Coulee chamber of commerce, while the Lewiston, Idaho, chamber declined to take action on a request by the Idaho Falls chamber that they oppose creation of the authority.
