KATHRIN NEUBERT

Kathrin Neubert, for the last 59 years a resident of Klamath county, Oregon, passed away at her late residence, 2143 Orchard avenue on Friday, March 30, 1944 at 7 a. m. following an illness of four and one-half years. She was a native of Wurtemberg, Germany and at the time of her death was aged 84 years 4 months and 27 days. Surviving are her husband, Gottfried Neubert, this city; one daughter, Mrs. C. B. Stiles of Klamath Falls, Oregon; two sons, Albert Neubert of Klamath Falls, Ore., and John Neubert of Seaside, Calif.; one half brother, Charles Martin of Pendleton, Ore.; 22 grandchildren and 27 great grandchildren. The remains rest in the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home, where friends may call after 12 noon Saturday. Notice of funeral to be announced in the next issue of this paper.

Kathrin Neubert, Pioneer Resident, Dies in City

Kathrin Neubert, for more than 59 years a resident of Klamath county, died at 7 o'clock Friday morning at her home, 2143 Orchard. Mrs. Neubert had been ill for the past four and one-half years and death came on her 84th year.

A true pioneer of the early days, Mrs. Neubert lived to see the Klamath basin grow from a sparsely settled area to a thriving section of southern Oregon. Kathrin Bauer was born in Wurtemberg, Germany, November 3, 1859. She came to America in 1886 and on the same boat was Gottfried Neubert who later became her husband.

Gottfried Neubert, Miss Bauer and a young woman who later became the wife of Fred Beck in Klamath Falls, and died here, landed in New York and crossed the continent to Ashland. As there was no means of transportation into what was then Lake county, now Klamath, Neubert bought a team and wagon and drove over the mountains to Linkville (Klamath Falls), where he and Miss Neubert were married June 25, 1886.

Mr. and Mrs. Neubert first settled on a pre-emption claim near Dairy where they lived five years, then took up a homestead in Antelope valley in 1901, and entered the cattle

In 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Neubert retired and sold their ranch, moving to the Orchard avenue residence.

Scores of friends and neighbors expressed sorrow today when they learned of the passing of Mrs. Neubert. Funeral services will be announced by Whitlock's. In addition to her husband, Gottfried, Mrs. Neubert is survived by one daughter, Mrs. C. B. Stiles of this city, two sons, William of Klamath Falls and John of Seaside, Calif.
