# Club President Urges Freedoms

The American delegation to San Francisco is urged to work for inclusion of a commission of human rights and fundamental freedoms under the economic and social council provided for in the Dumbarton Oaks proposals.

This request was presented last Saturday to the Honorable Edward R. Stettinius Jr., secretary of state, by Mrs. LaFell Dickinson, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Mrs. Dickinson stated that "Out of the recorded stand of the general federation for the kind of world we hope to hand down to coming generations we have assembled a declaration of principles."

The Declaration as sent to Secretary Stettinius reads: "The General Federation of Women's Clubs believes that the outgrowth of the primary concepts of the Dumbarton Oaks proposals... if they are designed to form a world based upon the fundamental principles in which men, women and children can live in freedom and in equity and above all without fear of the horrors of modern war. It believes that gradual fulfillment of universal aims for peaceful and friendly relations among nations is conditioned upon the stability and well-being of the peoples themselves. To this end the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges the American delegation at San Francisco to submit a concrete suggestion for the inclusion of a Commission of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms under the Economic and Social Council provided for in the Dumbarton Oaks Proposals which shall guarantee the consideration of individual injustices which lead to war, and the protection of sociological rights of human beings essential to spiritual as well as material growth."

Mrs. Dickinson and Mrs. William Dick Spierberg, of New York, the General Federation's chairman of International Relations are calling upon the 2,500,000 women of the organization to show a united front in supporting the federation's stand for a world organization which will minimize the chances of future wars, not only through the use of force to prevent aggression but through the guaranty of individual rights and freedoms.

The regular monthly meeting of the American Association of University Women was held on Saturday, March 24, at the Little Theatre.

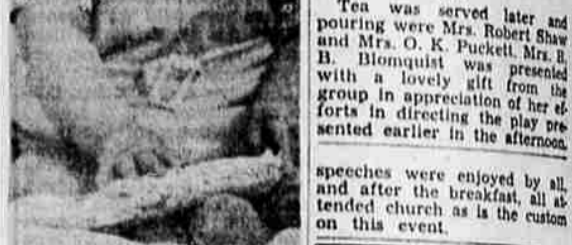
