"WELCOME, HAPPY MORNING AGE TO AGE SHALL SAY."

These are the opening words of an ancient Easter hymn, composed in the sixth century. They express fervently the joy that is in our hearts at Easter. All over the world today their meaning is uttered by millions who never heard the ancient hymn but who know the ancient truth that "Christ Is Risen From the Dead and Become the First-Fruits of Them That Slept."

Many customs of ancient times are clustered together in our celebration of the glorious Christian Festival of Easter. We are not wise if we despise them. We are foolish if we think these customs "explain" Easter. Nothing explains Easter but the glorious fact that Christ Is Risen; that Death had not dominion over Him; that He is alive forever.

The Christian religion is more than a statement of past occurrence. Christ lived and wrought and suffered and died at a certain definite time, within a certain defined geographical area. The memory of Him can never fade any more than the memory of Washington or Lincoln can fade from the American memory. But more wonderfully does Christ, the Living Christ, work in the hearts and minds of men; never absent from them, in every part of the globe, turning them to God, inviting them into the pathway of His will, inciting within them the passion of His Eternal Kingdom.

Therefore, though we live in a dark and cruel day, we will not be downcast. He is the author and the perfecter of our faith. We have not believed "an old wives' tale;" we have believed the Truth. He came, the Son of God, to redeem us and to present us acceptable unto God; His labors do not tarry. There is no moment of time when He is not reaching out and bringing the souls of men unto Himself and the day comes when "every tongue shall confess that He is King of Kings and Lord of Lords, and of His Kingdom there shall be no end."

Occasional Sky Reviews Helpful, Says Astronomer

That occasional sky reviews are desirable and helpful, and that information on the identity and location of the more conspicuous stars may definitely be explained in print without the use of star maps, is indicated in letters from readers of this column. Some who are inexperienced in the use of star maps consider them more confusing than helpful. But whatever the method of instruction, a desire to know and a willingness to observe will always—and easily—bring gratifying results.

During the next few days let us observe the sky around 9 p. m. We shall attempt to point out all the brighter stars and planets. Somewhat north of west and quite low, Venus, which for months has been so conspicuous, is still exceedingly brilliant. Earlier twilight observations will find it much higher. Within the next two weeks this splendid planet will disappear entirely from the western evening sky for the remainder of this year.

Nearly due west and well up in the sky the V-shaped formation known as The Hyades is easily spotted. All its stars are small with the exception of Aldebaran at the top of the left branch of the V.

Somewhat north of The Hyades, the tiny, compact cluster of six little stars, The Pleiades, adds charm to the evening. Some keen eyes see seven stars in the group—or even more.

Tracing down from the overhead point a short distance west-northwest, we easily find bright Capella. Beside this star are three stars in an elongated triangle.

Let us trace, again from the overhead point but go southwest. We soon encounter standing side by side two stars, the heavenly twins. The yellow one

on the right is Castor; the orange and slightly brighter one is his brother Pollux. Somewhat lower we pass a still brighter object which does not twinkle. This is the planet Saturn.

Between Saturn and the southwestern horizon, but well up the sky, the large, prominent constellation of Orion attracts instant attention. Highest is reddish Betelgeuse in Orion's shoulder; much lower, gleaming blue-white Rigel in his upraised foot. Between these, a short line of three equally-spaced stars outline the belt of Orion.

Not high and a little west of south brilliant Sirius, the dog star, sparkles. Above, higher, and more eastward than Sirius, we find bright Procyon.

Well up in the southeast the planet Jupiter is gorgeous. Higher and more to the west, Regulus appears at the end of the handle of the Sickle. Between the east and southeast, Spica twinkles not far above the horizon. Quite high in the sky somewhat north of due east, orange Arcturus flashes at the right end of the star group forming a horizontal kite.

another victory along the road, I have received through James L. Mahoney of the Manchester, N. H., Leader, the following statement by Gov. Charles M. Dale of New Hampshire:

"There are two ways our people can observe the collapse of German resistance in Europe. First, visit the churches and give thanks to God for guiding our leaders and men, and second, by buying war bonds with which to purchase arms and ammunition to defeat Japan and complete the job."

V-E Day Speculation

THE question of how V-E day will arrive in Europe—that is, the manner in which Germany will capitulate—is quite as much a matter of speculation as is the question of when it will arrive.

The way things are going there may be no formal surrender of the reich as an entity. The country is being so carved to pieces by the numerous allied drives that there may be no central authority, either military or civil, to speak for the nation.

In short, as intimated by Gen. Eisenhower, surrender may be imposed on Germany peacefully by the western allies and the Russians as we overrun the country. That being so, the time will arrive when Eisenhower and the soviet command will get their heads together and say: "Well, all resistance that's worth a tinker's dam has been knocked out. Let's call it V-E day."

That's the way observers generally view the situation now. Of course the Hitlerite regime—or what's left of it—might suddenly decide to throw up the sponge. However, that would be one of the major surprises of the war, since an allied sentence of liquidation hangs over Herr Hitler and his bloody-handed captains, and they aren't likely to put the noose about their own necks. On the contrary they have well defined schemes which gradually are becoming known.

Ruins Ahead

NATURALLY this continued hopeless resistance by military and civilians is reducing the country to ruins, and plunging the German people into greater depths of despair. Fantastic as it may seem, this is exactly what the nazi leaders want. But let me give you a view of this in the words of the British official military expert veritas who has excellent sources of information:

"The nazi leaders are fully prepared to see every German township turned into rubble and general holocaust. It is quite logical. The resulting chaos and starvation will be an allied burden. When anarchy reigns supreme in Europe, the twilight of the nazi gods—gotterdammerung—will be followed by a resurrection—not necessarily the resurrection of the German reich in the first instance, but of the nazi idea to which the tortured peoples of Europe will turn (the nazi calculate) in their horror of 'bolsehevism' and in their contempt and distrust of Anglo-American democracy which has failed them."

Veritas says that when the German leaders speak of confidence in final victory, they're not thinking of military victory but are planning 10 or 15 years ahead, to the restoration of nazism. However, this grandiose program is doomed to failure, as I see it, because the allies are forewarned and thus are fore-armed. The roots of nazism will be burned from the earth.

W. O. HARRIMAN TAKEN BY DEATH

LAKEVIEW—W. O. Harriman, forest supervisor of the Fremont National Forest, from 1934 to 1941 died from a heart attack at his home in Vista, Calif., Tuesday night.

Before coming to the Fremont as supervisor, he had been associated with the Deschutes national forest as forest ranger and assistant supervisor and supervisor of the Ochoco national forest.

He retired from the service in 1941, and has made his home in California since that time.

During the time Harriman was supervisor on the Fremont, many important building projects were completed and much progress was made in obtaining selective logging practices on the private lands within the forest.

He was born in 1880, and was 65-years-old at the time of death. Survivors are his widow, who resides in Vista; one daughter, Mrs. Helen Kiepe of Los Angeles, and one son, Bill, who is in the navy and had sailed just a few days before his father's death.

GERMANS CLING TO BOLOGNA ARC

ROME, March 31 (AP)—German forces clung stubbornly to their defense arc below Bologna yesterday in the face of numerous fifth army patrol stabs, allied headquarters announced today.

On the eighth army front, most of the activity was along the Senio river where there were a number of grenade duels. On one occasion, eighth army guns opened up on enemy movements near the Bagnacavallo-Lugo railway. There were a number of stiff patrol clashes in the mountains south of highway 9.

The Germans laid down some harassing artillery fire against forward areas along the fifth army sector.

UO Employment Secretary Dies

EUGENE, March 31 (AP)—Janet Smith, University of Oregon employment secretary who helped hundreds of students through college, died today in a hospital here at the age of 53.

Miss Smith, former general secretary of the YMCA in the northwest, came to the university in 1933. She helped start the girls' cooperative living houses, which enable students to attend college more cheaply.

Her mother and two sisters survive.
