RESEARCH FARM WORK TAILED HERE

Expanded research and experimental work by the Klamath farm experimental station was under discussion Saturday at a conference of state extension service and local advisory board members. The experimental area here this year will have about \$30,000, including \$10,000 from the state, \$10,000 from the county, and \$10,000 contributed locally.

It was planned to conduct work this year on class No. 5 lands and on peat soils, as well as to study the effects of certain chemicals in potato nematode control. Present at the conference were Ralph Besse, assistant director of experiment stations for the state extension service; Harry Scoth, USDA agronomist; D. D. Hall, Oregon State college agronomist; County Agent C. A. Henderson; A. E. Gross, in charge of the work here; Henry Semon, E. A. Geary and Dick Henzel, advisory board members, and Bob McCambridge, assistant county agent.
