

# HAWKINS SEES MOBILE POSTAL SERVICE SOON

The future outlook for post office service, Burt E. Hawkins, Klamath postmaster believes, is for mobile post offices serving outlying districts. There is no indication of a trend toward centralization of postal service, Hawkins asserts.

These mobile postal units would bring the post office to the home, with stamps, mail registry service, insurance and parcel post.

Correspondence is increasing in every business, time is the main element with the tempo of life increasing, and Hawkins asserts mail service will keep up with the times. Mail in the post-war era will all be transported by plane wherever possible, with the proposed feeder plane service taking part in the future plan, the postmaster said.

Two post offices in the county have been closed within the last year or so, Hawkins stated. They are Crystal and Algoma post offices. The Crystal post office was closed apparently because of the limited number of persons needing postal service, and the shortness of the season at the lake resort.

The Algoma post office was no longer necessary when the Algoma Lumber company receiving postal service was dissolved.

When the Shevlin-Hixon Lumber company was moved from Deschutes county to Klamath county, a new post office was installed in Klamath county to service lumber company employees.

There are 27 post offices in the county now, including Beatty, Bly, Bonanza, Cascade Summit, Chemult, Chiloquin, Crater Lake, Crescent, Crescent Lake, Dairy, Fort Klamath, Gilchrist, Keno, Kirk, Klamath Agency, Klamath Falls, Lake of the Woods, Malin, Merrill, Midland, Modoc Point, Mowich, Olene, Rocky Point, Sprague River, Shevlin and Worden.

Of these post offices, Klamath Falls is the only one employing more than two persons. Chiloquin, Malin and Merrill employ two, and most of the others have only a postmaster, or as in most bases in these small county post offices, a postmistress.

The Klamath Falls post office is the oldest in the county, having been established in 1872. The mail route then originated in Jacksonville, came down through Klamath Falls, and went down into northern California. Horse rigs were used to carry the mail mostly at that time, sleds were used in winter, and sometimes the mail had to be carried on foot because of the condition of the roads.

Col. W. G. T'Vault, founder of the Table Rock Sentinel was the first postmaster in southern Oregon.

# The War At a Glance

Western front: Allies battle to wipe out Germans trapped in Ruhr, fight into Kassel and Fulda. Americans 180 miles or less from Berlin; 45 from Nuernberg, and less than 200 from junction with Russians. British continue advance in north; Germans flee from Holland.

**Eastern front:** Russians close on Wiener Neustadt and Bratislava Gap, fighting 20 miles from Vienna and 12 from Bratislava. Glogau captured. Berlin reports heavy assault on Stettin.

**Italian front:** Artillery exchanges and patrol actions on land front; allied warships shell positions on French-Italian border.

**Pacific front:** U. S. 10th army infantrymen and marines invading Okinawa, 325 miles from Japan, push eastward toward Nakagusuku bay fleet anchorage, seize two airfields against light opposition in early stages; seaplanes operating from nearby Kerama Islands. Tokyo raided by probably 150 Superfortresses; Japanese casualties in Philippines raised to 307,000.

# COOS BAY SWEEP BY DAMAGING FIRE

**COOS BAY, April 2 (P)**—A fire threatening to raze the heart of Coos Bay's business section was extinguished Saturday after damaging four stores, at a loss estimated by owners in the thousands of dollars.

A coast guard fire boat pumped water from the bay to aid the fire department. The blaze, whose cause was not determined, prevented a passenger train from crossing the city for more than an hour after its scheduled departure.

Damaged shops were Hilton's Book Nook, Buster Brown shoe store, College Inn and Megale shine parlor. Twelve hours earlier firemen and coast guardsmen battled a blaze in Port Orford Cedar company's lumber kilns. The loss was estimated at \$1000.
