EUGENE, April 3 (AP)—Construction of an \$180,000 postwar building—a memorial to World War I and II veterans—is planned by Eugene's American Legion post No. 3. The structure will include Legion and auxiliary club rooms, a ball room, dining and reading rooms, and quarters for service officers. A corner quarter-block site already has been purchased.

MARK-DOWN PRICES STOPPED BY OPA

Methods to be used by apparel and home furnishing retailers in preparing their pricing charts under the new retail regulation MPR 580 have been revised to eliminate the use of mark-down prices offered to customers on March 19, the base day, according to Hosea Evans, district OPA price executive. This is being done to prevent discrimination against particular sellers which might arise from provisions of the regulations as they now stand. The regulation requires retailers to list on the charts, their prices for goods offered for sale on March 19 and under the amendment, effective April 4, the dealer may substitute his original offering prices for any mark-down prices at which he was offering items on the base date, Evans explained.
