

DEPOT SET UP FOR CLOTHING DRIVE IN CITY

The Lions club, sponsor of the United National Clothing Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA) clothing drive, has announced that a receiving depot for contributions has been established at 1415 Main.

Lloyd Lamb, theatre manager, has promised passes to matinees for three Saturdays, April 14, 21 and 28, in conjunction with the drive. Grade school students will receive passes for 10 pounds of clothing on April 14 and 21. High school students will receive passes for 25 pounds of clothing on April 28. The bundles are to be brought to the theatres which wish to attend on the days mentioned, and will be weighed on the lobby.

Clothing contributed to the drive is to be used for persons in war-devastated areas.

Garments may be new or used, but must be in good condition. Infants' knit wear is especially needed, as well as outer and undergarments for boys and girls, men and women. Bedding and shoes are also in demand. Cotton garments must be washed but not necessarily ironed. Summer or winter clothing is acceptable. Evening clothes are not desired.

All factories and industries producing wearing apparel have been leveled in the enemy wake and months, if not years, will be needed before production is back to normal.

The clothing drive sponsored by the Lions club is an opportunity for every member of free America to offer a helping hand to their less fortunate neighbors across the waters, Kaiser states. Now is the time to clear out the attic, basement and storage lockers of clothing no longer in use and pass it on to the best use possible.

The national drive is for 150,000,000 pounds of clothing to be distributed free among those in need. While no local quota of poundage has been set, Moore states his confidence that Klamath county will not be found lagging at the end of the month when the collection is to be shipped.

Mumps Lead Disease List In Klamath

Cases of communicable diseases reported for the first time in Klamath county during the week ending March 17, listed one case of scarlet fever, one of measles or German measles, three of chicken pox, 18 of mumps, two of syphilis, five of gonorrhea and one of undulant fever.

This list was the report of 90 per cent of the physicians of Klamath county.

Federal Court To Be Held Here For Two Weeks

Federal court, scheduled to be held in Klamath county circuit court rooms starting April 5, will take up about two weeks time.

First criminal case to be heard after that date by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg is that of state vs. Samuel Dennis Gathwright, charged with possession of stolen property. The case grew out of the alleged theft of grain sacks from the Malone warehouse. A plea of innocence has been entered by Gathwright, indicted by the Klamath county jury.

The Gathwright trial is slated for April 23. U. S. Balentine is attorney for the defendant.

120 ACRES SOLD IN MALIN AREA

One of the largest real estate transactions in the southern section of the county was recorded Tuesday afternoon in the county clerk's office.

The sale involved some 120 acres one mile northeast of Malin owned by R. W. and Helen J. Steele and sold to Laddie and Gladys Rajnus and William and Mildred J. Rajnus. It is understood that the transfer also included buildings on the properties.

Revenue stamps on the deed indicated a consideration of approximately \$40,000.

Wife's Picture Found In Germany

LOS ANGELES, April 4 (AP)—In a bombed out German farmhouse, Capt. Harry (Pete) Parkin Jr., found a picture of his wife, Virginia. He sent it to her in Los Angeles. She explained: In the 1932 Olympic games here she served as a junior hostess at a dinner for German and Norwegian athletes. The picture was taken then. One of the Germans apparently took it home with him.

PRICE RAISE NOT ANSWER TO PUZZLE

An increase in prices to meat packers is not necessarily the answer to the current meat situation, according to R. L. Clark, secretary of the Portland livestock exchange, in a statement released by McDannell Brown, district OPA director, who had asked for an expression of opinion from interested local parties on the meat controversy in Washington.

"Everybody knows that in the not too distant past, there were some pretty good profits in processing meats," Clark declared. "A majority of the livestock producers have been in a squeeze most of the time. But when it is all said and done, a rise in prices won't necessarily give the answer."

In speaking of price control generally, Clark said that a breakdown now in the last minute of play might create national chaos.

He went on to say that the office of price administration had made a lot of mistakes, and none of us liked it when they tried to take over and regiment our whole economy, but he also admitted that by and large, the OPA had rendered a real service.

Declaring that the Oregon Farmers union is "wholeheartedly supporting the OPA in their battle against inflation," Wendell E. Barnett, vice-president of the Oregon State Farmers Union, had this to say on the meat situation:

"While we feel that the pres-

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ent meat shortage is partially due to lack of a stabilized price for livestock, we do not believe that increased profits to pack- ers will correct the situation. Meat is produced by farmers, not packers."

Portland Man Drowns While Smelt Fishing

PORTLAND, April 4 (AP)—A 26-year-old Portland man who was among crowds of fishermen taking smelt from the Sandy river was listed a drowning victim today.

The fisherman, Thomas W. Leonard Jr., slipped from a rock and fell into the stream yesterday, but could not swim. His father, who jumped in after him, failed in a rescue attempt.

Andrew M. Alagamba, 47, Portland, rowed to the rescue of Albert Miller, 17, Portland, who nearly drowned when he lost his footing while wading in the smelt-choked river.
