CHANGE IN BUS STOPS SCHEDULED

CHARLES WRIGHT HOME ON FURLOUGH

Sgt. Charles T. Wright, whose left breast is beribboned and sprinkled with stars and Oak Leaf clusters, signifying action in the European theater of operations, is home on a 16-day furlough.

Sgt. Wright, accompanied by his wife Abbie, is here from Kingman, Ariz., where he is taking a refresher course. They are visiting the sergeant's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Wright of Stewart addition.

Wright spent six months in the ETO, where he accomplished 29 missions as a ball turret gunner. He had received 18 months' training in the United States before going overseas.

Sgt. Wright is a graduate of KTHS. He was employed by Kalpine Plywood company prior to entering the service, December 17, 1941.

In March, 1944, he went to England, and returned to the United States in September of the same year, having successfully accomplished his missions. He was married in Florida just before going overseas.

After a 30-day furlough, Wright reported back for duty and was stationed at Sheppard field, Tex., and at Denver before going to Kingman.
