TAX REDUCTION FIGHT ENTERS FINAL PHASE

SACRAMENTO, April 5 (AP)—Perhaps the final round in Governor Warren's administration's fight for the bill to extend 1943 tax reductions another two years was in prospect in the legislature today, while the health insurance issue remained in cold storage.

A roll call will be the necessary next move to bring two major compulsory health insurance bills from the committee and the sponsors must muster a majority vote in the assembly to do the job.

The tax reduction battle will be renewed in the assembly, administration sources said, only in event the attendance is enough to warrant hopes of obtaining the needed majority of 41 votes.

The health insurance problem cannot be touched until tomorrow because of a house rule requiring that two days elapse before action is taken on any motion to withdraw a bill from committee.

The committee had recommended postponement of legislation pending a two-year study, before current hearings were completed.

The \$100,000 state subsidies

to counties and cities measure came back onto the senate floor late yesterday for brief debate and adoption of proponent's amendments eliminating some restrictions on the spending of any grants made to counties for county roads.

As amended supervisors could use their share of the proposed \$25,000,000 of state allocations, to build county roads to specifications provided by county engineers rather than by the state public works department.

Pvt. Beverly Thomas, native Klamathite and in civil life a local plastering contractor, is home on leave from McCaw hospital at Walla Walla, where he has been recovering from wounds received in France.

Pvt. Thomas wears the Combat Infantry badge, the Purple Heart with Oak Leaf cluster, and the European theater of war stripe with two battle stars.

Pvt. Thomas was first wounded, September 9 at Souey, when he was hit in the shoulder and face with shrapnel. At Thiaville, on November 5, he was hit in the knee. In crawling back out of the gunfire area, Thomas was forced to dodge American tanks which were crossing the area at the time.

Pvt. Thomas was reported missing for a short period in September, and the news was flashed back home. He was cut off from his unit for a few hours, but was able to get back and rejoin his outfit.

He was hospitalized in France, and came back to the U. S., March 7.

Pvt. Thomas and his wife will visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Thomas, here for two weeks before returning to Walla Walla.

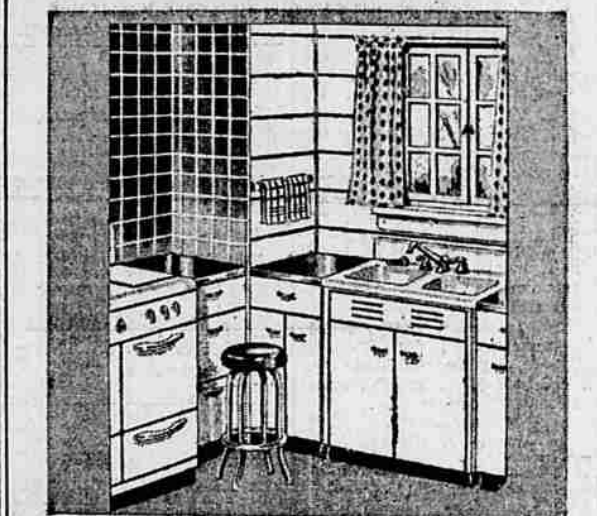
