Baron Suzuki's retention of the key non-military posts recalled speculation that, with his old time reputation as a moderate, he may have been selected to lead efforts to arrive at a negotiated peace. The cabinet positions he kept for himself are the ones that would be involved in any peace offensive.

Admiral Yonai was second man and originally co-premier in the cabinet of Premier Gen. Kuniaki Koiso which fell last week under increasing demands for a strong war government.

It already had been announced Hironaka Matsuzaka, justice minister in the fallen Koiso cabinet, would be retained in his post.

RITTER GETS MEDAL
AN 8TH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England — Sgt. Walter N. Ritter, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Ritter, of Bonanza, has been awarded the Air Medal, it was recently announced at this Flying Fortress base.

The citation accompanying the decoration read in part: "For meritorious achievement while participating in sustained combat bomber operations over Germany and German occupied countries."

A B-17 Flying Fortress tall gunner, Sgt. Ritter has flown several heavy bombardment combat missions with the pioneer 379th bomb group. He took part in recent attacks against targets in Cologne, Mannheim, Merseburg and

against tactical objectives in advance of troops on the western front.

A member of the army air force since January, 1944, he completed basic training and then attended the AAF gunnery school at Las Vegas, Nev. After finishing overseas training at Gulfport, Miss., Sgt. Ritter arrived in England in January, 1945.

Prior to enlistment the sergeant was a student at the Bonanza high school.

RECEIVE COMMENDATION
First Lt. Theodore E. Myers of Portland, Ore., and other members of an engineer aviation battalion, have been commended for an outstanding job in speeding to completion B-29 Superfortress installations on the Marianas islands base.

The commendation, one of the first to be received by a negro unit in the Pacific area, was made by Lt. Gen. Millard F. Harmon, commanding general, who has since been reported as missing in action. The commendation reads in part:

"The work of this battalion as displayed in the completion of a difficult task in a short period of time is outstanding, particularly so, in view of the fact that in no way was the quality of their work sacrificed to accelerate construction."

Lt. Myers' wife, Irene, and children, Joyce, Patricia, Mae and Richard, live at 3234 N. E. Fremont in Portland. His mother, Mrs. W. P. Myers, lives in Klamath Falls.

Myers was graduated from Klamath Union high school with the class of 1926, later attending the University of Oregon. He entered the army in July of 1942.

Catarthal Jaundice Reported In Umatilla

PENDLETON, April 7 (AP)—A jaundice which has stricken 25 people here, feared to be an infectious tropical disease, is only catarrhal jaundice—a comparatively mild ailment, the acting state health officer said today.

Umatilla county physicians thought returning Pacific war veterans might have carried the dread tropical variety of jaundice. Dr. Albert Miller said early symptoms of the mild and serious disease were identical. Most of the cases are children.

Joint Use of Snow Equipment Authorized

SACRAMENTO, April 7 (AP)—California is empowered to enter into agreements with adjoining states on the use of road equipment to clear snow under terms of a bill given final leg-

islative approval yesterday by the senate.

The assembly-approved bill will enable this state to use Nevada's equipment in clearing snow close to the state line at Lake Tahoe, and the same arrangement will be made on California-Oregon line, said Sen. Jerrold L. Seawall, Roseville.

minister and Greater East Asia minister (he's already premier). The jobs he gave himself are the ones that would be involved in future PEACE moves.

He kept the former navy minister (who has now been given three bad lickings by our fleet) and named an airman war minister. Both his navy and war ministers are said to have the blessing of the Jap war clique.

THERE is still nothing much new in the European situation. We're killing and capturing Germans at a great rate—especially capturing them. We took 156,723 prisoners in the first five days of April. The Germans are not as good as the Japs at dying to the last man, as Hitler orders them to do.

THE British are 12 miles from Bremen and 60 from Hamburg. The Canadians are within a dozen miles of cutting off all of western Holland. We're over the Weser in the south, but have not yet reached the Elbe.

The Germans are still talking about our alleged airborne landing at Eisleben, within 90 miles of Berlin, but our side has nothing to say. The censorship is still pretty tight.

It is probable that we have been outrunning our supplies and have to wait for them to catch up.

THERE is bitter house-to-house fighting in Vienna, but Moscow dispatches indicate that the Russians think they have the situation there well in hand. Moscow says that if the Germans don't get out of the city soon they'll be surrounded.

The Germans say today the Russians are ALREADY 30 MILES WEST OF VIENNA, following main line railroads and highways up the Danube. That, if true, is extremely interesting, indicating that the reds are pushing right on up the Danube valley to cut the Germans off from the Hitler hideout in the southern mountains.

The flurry in Italy doesn't seem to amount to much—yet.

A NEW decree has been issued by Hitler, ordering nazi party leaders to give up their local political jobs. London interprets the decree as a scheme to enable the nazi leaders to get out, leaving the non-nazi holding the bag—also as the foundation for a propaganda claim in the future that it was the German civilians who surrendered shamefully while the nazi carried on the holy war single-handed.

Regional Vocational School Studied Here

O. I. Paulson, state director of vocational education, and several of his staff will be in Klamath Falls, Monday, April 9, to meet with the local board of education and various representatives of industry to formulate plans for expansion of vocational training to be offered in the local school.

Klamath Falls has been suggested as a likely location for a regional vocational school serving this area of southeastern Oregon.

A survey will be made and various industrial trades, agriculture and its related industries, distributive education and home economics will be studied on this basis.

Committees have been appointed to assist in the survey, and anyone interested may attend the general meeting to be held at 7:30 p. m. Monday in room 310 of the high school.

Portland's Populace Decreases, Report

PORTLAND, April 7 (AP)—Decrease in Portland's war populace was indicated today by figures showing 6376 fewer streetcars and bus passengers during March than in February.

Portland Traction company officials said the first six days of April showed an even larger percentage drop. The March traffic load fell off 1.5 per cent.

Shipyard Worker Dies From Injuries

PORTLAND, April 7 (AP)—Injuries suffered in a fall from a scaffolding at Commercial Iron Works Thursday had proved fatal today to Paul F. Stomley, 38-year-old shipyard worker.

Stomley, whose home formerly was in Rapid City, S. D., died yesterday at a hospital.
