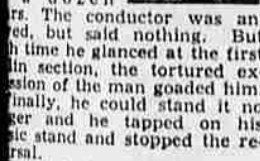
**Medical Care** — Mrs. J. J. Posch, 723 N. 11th, is receiving dental care at Klamath Valley hospital.
