

CALIFORNIANS MAY DECIDE ON MAJOR ISSUES

SACRAMENTO, April 9 (P)—Starting the sixth week of its current session without having passed a major bill, the California legislature reconvened from a weekend recess today with the prospects a determination may be reached on some of the issues which have stalemated it.

Three controversial subjects are credited with having deadlocked the session and delayed, through maneuvering for position on the calendar, enactment of any of the Warren administration's bills. They are health insurance, tax reduction and state subsidies to cities and counties for postwar projects and improvements.

The governor's forces have been unable to break the log jam by separating the question of tax reduction from the demand of local governments for state grants so that a clear cut vote can be obtained on whether the \$100,000,000 of tax reductions established by the 1943 legislature will be continued another two years.

Success or failure of the administration on this endeavor is said to depend on a ruling made earlier in the session by Assembly Speaker Charles Lyon that he will hold an amendment can be eliminated by a subsequent amendment. If the assembly supports him in this ruling, the Warren forces will be privileged to try for the 41 votes needed to strike the amendment out of the fourth bill and thus kill the rider allocating \$57,000,000 to cities and counties.

Two new courses for snow measurements were added on the Modoc national forest this year in order to increase the accuracy of the forecast of the amount of water that will flow into Shasta dam, according to Supervisor Mel Barron.

Measurements for the season have been completed by Ranger Iverson of Cedarville and Ranger Campbell of Adin. Orval Vincent and Walter Cantrall made the measurement on the summit of Eagle peak in the South Warner range. Snow depths ranged from 54 to 80 inches with water content of 20 to 27 inches.

Larsen replaces Carl Domino, for many years clerk at the Willard who served as manager when R. C. Brooks resigned. The War At a Glance

The Western front: American and British spearheads fought within sight of Bremer and Hannover as allies roll beyond Weser river to within 70 miles of the Elbe. U. S. ninth army troops hammered into Essen, largest city in Ruhr. Canadian first and allied first airborne armies just about complete, sealing the Holland trap; American seventh and French first armies were fashioning a trap in Black Forest area.

The Russian front: Soviet troops drove within a mile of the heart of Vienna; Russian high command calls on Germans to prevent the total destruction of the Austrian capital.

Italian front: American fifth army troops closed in on Massa, 144 miles southeast of La Spezia, west coast naval base.

The Pacific front: Heavy fighting raged in southern Okinawa as Japanese began their expected bitter defense of the island; fighter planes now using captured Okinawa airfields; Superfortresses bombed airfields in Kanoya sector on southern tip of Japanese home island of Kyushu; U. S. sixth army troops in Philippines captured major road network in Tayabas province, cutting land escape routes for Japanese on Bicol peninsula of Luzon.

WATER SUPPLY IN LAKE COUNTY GOOD

LAKEVIEW, April 9 (P)—A prediction of fair to good water supplies for Lake county's 930,000 acres relying on reservoirs and streams—a picture much brighter than last year's—was made by the annual forecast committee.

Only exception was the northern part of the county, where lower ranges are comparatively poor. Otherwise, enough stock water for the entire area is forecast.

Irrigation experts, speaking at the last of seven such meetings east of the Cascades, said range prospects throughout Lake county are about average. Larry Mays, Fremont national forest supervisor, termed forest range prospects "good."

C. E. Sharp Resigns Merrill Mills Post

Resignation of C. E. Sharp as manager of Merrill Mills, effective May 1, and appointment of Gus Haglund to fill the position, has been announced by the board of directors of the local concern. Sharp has been affiliated with Merrill Mills as stockholder and manager since its organization. Haglund has been with Merrill Mills four months after one-and-one-half years with Dechutes Grain and Feed company, Redmond. Previous to that time he was employed by the Oregon extension service for 14 years.

PORTLAND, April 9 (P)—Families of the soviet purchasing commission have asked the city council to approve a school teaching Russian.

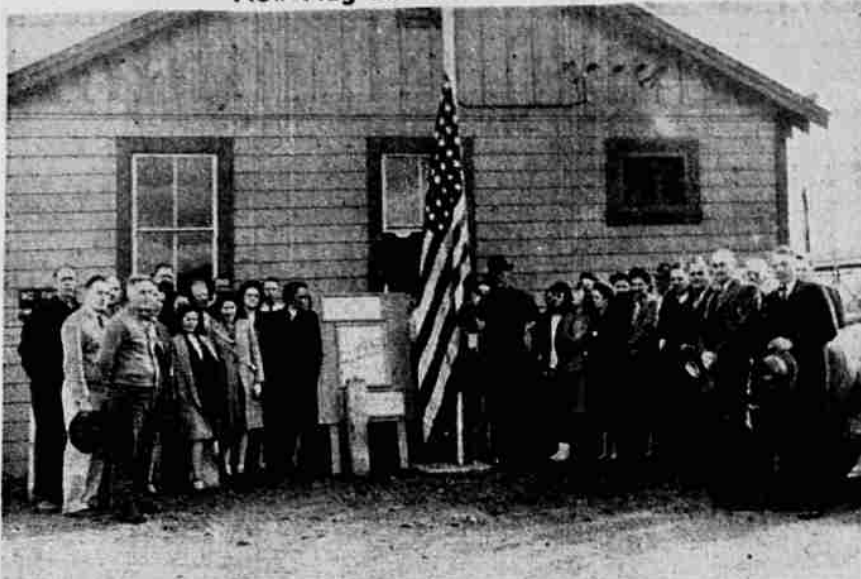

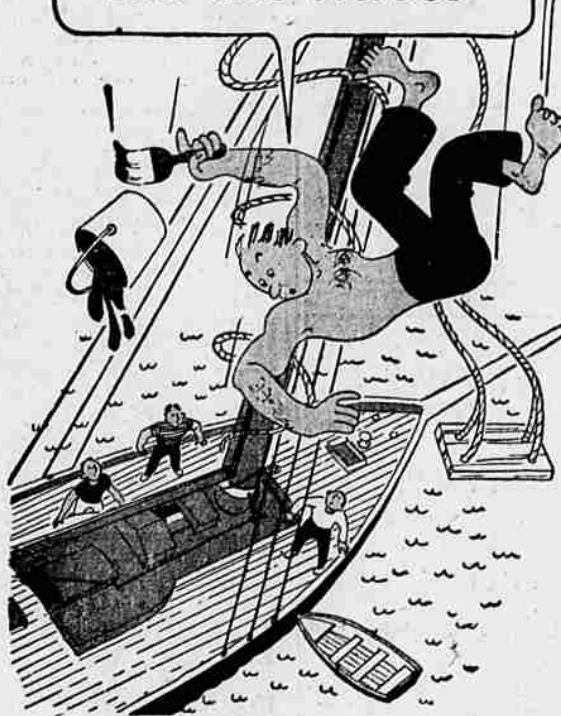

A joint Oregon-California farm wage board hearing for the entire Klamath basin has been scheduled for the Merrill high school gymnasium at 10 a. m., Thursday, April 12.

This hearing will be for Siskiyou and Modoc counties, California, and Klamath county, Ore. It was decided to combine the hearings for both sides of the state line.

Some 12 or 14 men are expected to be present as representatives of the two WFA wage boards. The hearing is being legally advertised, and growers are obtaining signatures asking for it.

Purpose of the meeting is to obtain information concerning the type of work, areas to be controlled, specific wage ceilings for all operations in production, planting, growing and harvesting onions, potatoes, wheat, barley, other grains and hay; dairying, care and management of products, livestock and poultry, and all agricultural activities in Siskiyou and Modoc counties.
