

GUY BARTON RANCH SOLD TO SCHMECKS

Sale of the Guy Barton ranch in the Poe valley section was made known today with transfer of the 270-acre place by Guy and Mildred Barton to Albert W. and Vada H. Schmeck.

Revenue stamps on the deed on file in the county clerk's office reveal an estimated consideration of \$34,000. The Schmecks recently disposed of their holdings in the Midland district.

Mr. and Mrs. Barton plan to move by May 1, to their new country home near the Lakeview junction which they purchased this week from Buell Orrell.

Also recorded in the county clerk's office was sale of 70 acres owned by Louis and Francis Kalina to Alvey Lloyd and Elsie M. Mock, the property located one-quarter of a mile west of Malin. Revenue stamps on the deed give an estimated consideration of \$10,000.

Property located in the same section near Malin was sold by Oscar and Emma Brickner to Milford and Sarah Fuston. The sale involved 64.49 acres and stamps on the deed revealed a consideration of \$10,000.

James and Dionysia Lampropoulos have sold to Walter and Bertha Keele, property in Industrial addition of Klamath Falls, with an estimated consideration of \$12,000, according to revenue stamps on the deed now on file in the clerk's office.

The War At a Glance

The Western Front: Nine armies rolled ahead against what Eisenhower called collapsed resistance toward junction with Russians; Hannover toppled, white flags flown in Brunswick; Leipzig, Hamburg menaced.

The Russian Front: Two soviet armies tightened siege ring around nazis in Vienna area; Germans driven from most of Austrian capital; Russians pounded ahead beyond Bratislava.

The Italian Front: British captured Lugo, other towns, in new offensive across Senio river; Americans cleared Massa on the road to the La Spezia naval base.

The Pacific Front: Americans landed on Jolo, controlling Sulu chain; marines advanced northward on Okinawa; artillery raged on southern flank; Chinese reported pursuing enemy in northwestern Honan, advancing in southwest Honan; British in Burma closed in on Hlaingdet, eight miles from highway to the Shan states.

BRITISH DEATHS TOTAL 216,287

LONDON, April 11 (AP)—British armed forces suffered 502,396 casualties including 216,287 dead up to February 28, Prime Minister Churchill told commons today.

In addition, 183,242 servicemen from the United Kingdom either were prisoners of war or internees in neutral countries, he said.

These figures do not include the deaths of members of the armed forces from natural causes or casualties of civilians or merchant seamen due to enemy action.

In a written report, Churchill also listed Canada's losses at 89,220, including 31,439 killed, 45,251 wounded and 8367 prisoners, and Australia's at 87,256, including 19,430 killed, 35,593 wounded and 45,276 prisoners.

\$178 Million Worth Of Food Produced

BOISE, Ida., April 11 (AP)—Fourteen U. S. bureau of reclamation projects in the Pacific northwest produced foodstuffs valued at \$178,121,319 during 1944, R. J. Newell, acting regional director of the bureau, reported yesterday.

The figure represents an average per acre yield of \$99.59, and is \$7,746,459 higher than the previous high set in 1943.

Full or supplemental water supplies for more than 2,016,830 acres is provided by the bureau in this area.
