GRIFFIN CITED WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—Capt. Donovan C. Griffin of Klamath Falls recently was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action.

He is serving on the fifth army front in Italy with the 135th infantry regiment, 34th "Red Bull" division.

When his company was attacked by an overwhelming enemy force, Griffin exposed himself to intense machine gun and machine pistol fire to personally direct his men. Determined to hold his hard-won ground, related the citation with the award, Griffin skillfully adjusted artillery fire to within yards of his positions to check the hostile onslaught.

His accurate fire directions forced the enemy to disperse and withdraw, in disorganized retreat, then utilized all his weapons to further destroy the enemy. His fighting spirit and courageous leadership inspired his men to inflict heavy losses.

His wife, Violet, lives on route 3, city.

HIBBARD IN ITALY WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—T/Sgt. Webster H. Hibbard Jr., son of Mrs. Myrtle Hibbard of 402 Riverside, is a member of the 752nd tank battalion, which is credited with killing 1400 Germans, capturing 484 others, knocking out 11 tanks and disabling three others and destroying 21 pillboxes, 41 vehicles and 64 guns.

The outfit, now in the Apennine mountains before the Po Valley, has been in the line with the fifth army about 300 days since it was indoctrinated in battle near Fondi, Italy, last spring.

The tankers entered Rome with some of the first allied troops to reach the capital.

RUNNELS PROMOTED AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE LIBERATOR STATION, ENGLAND—Harold B. Runnels, son of Mrs. Leonard J. McKinnon of 2209 Union, Klamath Falls, Ore., has been promoted from corporal to sergeant.

A gunner of a B-24 Liberator, Sgt. Runnels has taken part in bombing missions over Berlin, Augsburg, Siegen, and other war production centers of Germany. He is a member of the 446th bomb group, which has completed more than 200 missions against enemy targets. The group has participated in the eighth air force's steady bombing of the principal targets in Europe.

Sgt. Runnels has been awarded the Air Medal, "for meritorious achievement in accomplishing with distinction aerial operational missions over enemy occupied continental Europe. The courage, coolness and skill displayed by him in the face of determined opposition materially aided in the successful completion of these dangerous missions. His actions reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States."

Sgt. Runnels entered the service August 19, 1943, and at the time was employed by the Smith
