Seattle's rapping Rainiers scored their fifth straight victory last night to take undisputed leadership of the Pacific coast baseball league, defeating the hapless Hollywood Stars 4-3 on the latter's home field.

Portland, which had been deadlocked at the top with the Rainiers, ran into trouble as a 6-3 victory in their home debut.

Oakland's Acorns, riding the tide of a winning streak, kept firm hold on third place by nosing out San Diego on the Padre's diamond, 2-1, while Sacramento went into fourth place by white-washing Los Angeles 3-0 before a home crowd.

Elliott Huris Six-Hitter
The Rainiers' southpaw ace, Glenn Elliott, posted his third straight win in twirling the league-leader into the top spot. He tossed a six-hitter and fanned seven while his teammates were overcoming a two-run Hollywood first inning lead.

The Beavers ran into too much San Francisco power at the plate as the Seals exploded with a three-run barrage in the eighth to break a three-all tie.

Jake Mooney, who went the distance on the mound for Portland, weakened to allow a double and three singles which accounted for the Seals' three-tally margin.

"Stub" Allison Gets Heave-Ho From UC

BERKELEY, Calif., April 11 (AP)—Leonard B. (Stub) Allison today ascribed to "alumni pressure" his surprise discharge as football coach at the University of California after 10 years' service.

Allison's release, voted by the student body's executive committee after conferences with the faculty, was announced last night at a press conference in San Francisco.

"The ASUC voted not to renew the contract of Mr. Leonard B. (Stub) Allison at his weekly meeting last night," the committee said in a statement. Allison's contract expires May 31, but no successor was indicated.

"Temporary arrangements for a coaching staff to carry on the sport pending the release of permanent personnel from the armed forces is under consideration and will be announced soon," the statement said after expressing "high regard" for Allison's "long and valuable service."

Allison Perplexed
Obviously perplexed by the undergraduates attitude, Allison declared: "I didn't resign. I was fired. I am content to let it stand that way on the record." He disclosed he had been asked to resign but declined.

During his tenure, Allison's teams won 58 games and lost 42. Last year—one of Allison's poorest—California won three games while losing six and tying one.

His greatest was the "Thunder Team" of 1937 which remained unbeaten and defeated Alabama in the Rose Bowl, 13-0.

Allison succeeded Navy Bill Ingram in 1935 after serving under him four years as line coach.

"The Stubber" is a champion athlete of Carleton college, Minn., in 1917 and after a hitch in World War I as artillery battery commander coached at Washington, at South Dakota, served as state director and organizer of Legion junior baseball for South Dakota for five years; as coach and boxing coach at Fresno, Calif., from 1927 to 1930.

Allison said today: "Maybe I'll coach and maybe not. I'm going to have a little 'think' about it."
