

**AL DEAL
PROPOSED BY
REP. DE LACY**

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—A bill calling for the design of 250,000,000 pounds of aluminum would leave the United States holding the bag should the metal suddenly, as it has in the past, be in short supply. The bill, introduced by Rep. Hugh De Lacy (D-Wash.), contended that the small business committee should accept a minimum of 500,000 pounds of metal under contract with the shipping of Canadian Aluminum Company. If the Metals Reserve Corporation wishes to participate, it should be added, in the bill, to the Canadian company deliver 90,275,000 pounds of metal, making a total of 640,275,000 pounds which this would be required to accept.

contract will unquestionably be the postwar disposal of aluminum in the United States. The bill would be the first instrument to be devised to keep aluminum out of the hands of the government. It would also be the first to require that earlier contracts for the Canadian metal be kept in force. The Metals Reserve with 500,000 pounds of aluminum in Canada, which is the shutdown of even the Coast plants "which is most attractive to new investment after the war."

Foreign Dishes with an American Accent

For variety and zest why not prepare the famous dishes of other countries? You'll find they offer subtle, delicate flavor... appealing to the whole family. Here are three recipes for famous international dishes, none of which makes inroads on your ration books.

- RUSSIAN BORSCH**
- 2 lbs. beef stew meat
 - 2 1/2 tps. salt
 - 1/2 tsp. allspice
 - 4 cups coarsely grated raw beets
 - 1/2 cup lemon juice
 - 1/2 cup finely diced green pepper or cut parsley
 - 1 cup finely diced onion
 - 2 cups thinly sliced celery
 - 2 cups canned tomatoes
 - 3 cups finely shredded cabbage

Slowly cook meat with salt and allspice in cold water to cover 3 hours. Strain; measure broth, adding enough water to make 4 cups. Combine grated beets and lemon juice. Cook green pepper, onion and celery in just enough boiling water to cover 15 minutes; add cabbage, beets and tomatoes; cook 15 minutes longer. Drain vegetables thoroughly; add vegetables to broth; heat to boiling. Serve with whipped or plain sour cream; sprinkle with parsley. Serves 6 generously.

- MEXICAN CHILI BEANS**
- 1 cup dried pink or red beans
 - 2 medium-size onions
 - 1 large green pepper or 2 small chili peppers
 - 1 bud garlic
 - 3/2 cups cooked tomatoes
 - 1 tbs. salt
 - 1 to 2 tbs. chili powder

Pick over beans; wash; place beans in large kettle; add water to cover; partly cover kettle. Cook slowly 1 hour. Add sliced onions, peppers, minced garlic, tomatoes, and salt. Continue cooking slowly about 2 hours longer, or until beans are tender but still hold their shape. Add more water as needed to keep beans well covered with liquid. Add chili powder to taste just before serving. Serves 6 generously.
