

Old Secretary to Arrive Here

Eldora DeMots, Camp Fire Girls national associate field secretary of the northwest district, will arrive in Klamath Falls on Saturday, April 20, Mrs. Jewel Contrall, local executive announced.

Events already scheduled for her five-day visit with the Camp Fire Girls and their adult leaders include a tea for their mothers, and friends, on April 21; a guardians' meeting on April 23; and an executive board meeting on April 24. The training course which is to be conducted by Miss DeMots will be of great benefit to the girls and their leaders, and any one interested in Camp Fire work is invited to attend.

One of the most important of DeMots' duties is the re-education of new volunteer leaders for Camp Fire work in her territory. Girls in her territory include Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Nevada. For the past two summers she has been one of the directors of the training course for Camp Fire executives given at the college in Oakland, California. For a number of years she has been one of the national staff members visiting Camp Fire girls throughout the country to conduct training courses for Camp Fire groups.

Miss DeMots, "Any serving program can only be as strong as the adults who sort it. The need for such organizations is perhaps stronger now, and will be in the future, than it has ever been. The very real needs of young people on whom the future depends are too numerous to be met by the time and war period. The time and energy of many men and women in our community are needed to make the Camp Fire program available to the large number of 7 to 18-year-old girls who want it."

Majoring in health, physical education, and recreation, DeMots received her B.A. degree from Fresno State college in California. Before joining the Camp Fire Girls national staff in 1931, Miss DeMots had been in charge of the physical education department of the Kern county school and junior college in Bakersfield, California, and directed the Camp Fire program there for four summers, as well as serving as a volunteer leader of a Camp Fire group. She has done graduate work at Fresno college, the University of California, Columbia University and the University of Hawaii. She is a native Minnesotan.
