

\$24 BILLION BILL FOR NAVY APPROVED

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—A \$24,879,510,546 supply bill to support the navy's knock-out drive against Japan won house appropriations committee approval today. It will finance operations for the year starting July 1.

With it, the committee sent to the house floor a formal report voicing hope "the end may not be far distant" and explaining that the large outlay was necessary because "we can ill afford to proceed on hopes or assumptions."

The total in the bill—\$23,400,502,133 in new appropriations and the balance in contracts authority and reappropriations—was \$6,903,560,155 less than was made available to the navy during the current fiscal year. A large part of the present fund, however, will not be obligated until the new fiscal year starts.

Wabbles Ranch Home Sold to Couple

Sale of the Wabbles ranch home one mile east of the Merrill highway in the Spring Lake district by Minnie Wabbles to S. P. and Frieda Dehlinger, was learned today with the filing of a deed in the county clerk's office.

European fighting we have been following MacArthur's strategy of by-passing and leaving.

It must be kept always in mind that this time we are facing something new in modern warfare.

Hitherto nations have surrendered their armies when they are hopelessly beaten. This time, both in Germany and Japan, it is war to the death. This is no chess game. It is war for keeps.

Whipping the nazis is much like breaking up the Dillinger gang of murderers and cut-throats, but on a millionfold bigger scale.

IN the Pacific, we're going after the NESTS from which the Jap suicide planes are coming to attack our fleet around Okinawa. Raiding groups of our Superforts have been blasting Jap fields on Kyushu for three days in a row.

Jap suicide surface boats are reported today to be joining the suicide planes in attacking us. (Every Jap that commits suicide is one less for us to kill.)

The lines on Okinawa are unchanged today. We've so far killed 9108 Japs there and captured 391.

ON the home front, new President Truman announces that there will be no lifting of the racing ban, the midnight curfew or the "brownout" (meaning cutting down big city street lighting to save current.)

He tells the reporters at his first news conference that he won't go to San Francisco, adding that he has a competent delegation there and will back them up "from my desk in the White House, WHERE I BELONG."

He appoints a St. Louis banker federal loan administrator—which is strictly a banking job.

THERE is word from Moscow today that Molotov's coming to San Francisco (arranged by Stalin in response to a request from Truman) reflects Russia's sincere desire for co-operation with her allies in building a sound and durable peace.

Special Election Set For State, City

County Clerk Charles F. DeLap today received official notification from Governor Earl Snell of a special election to be held throughout Oregon on Friday, June 22.

Two bills are referred to the people by legislative assembly. One is a bill authorizing a tax levy for the state building fund. The other is a bill authorizing a cigarette tax to support public schools.

The city of Klamath Falls will also hold a special city election simultaneously with the state election.

School Apportionment Received Here

Klamath county was richer by \$87,999, today when the state department distributed \$2,500,000 apportioned to schools for 1944 from the surplus income tax revenues.

The amount was the last half of the \$5,000,000 apportioned for this purpose. The recent legislature boosted the annual apportionment to \$8,000,000 for the next two years. The first half of the 1944 apportionment was made last October. Klamath county received the sixth largest amount distributed.

Churchill Says FDR Great Friend

LONDON, April 17 (AP)—In deeply emotional terms, Prime Minister Churchill today eulogized Franklin D. Roosevelt as "the greatest American friend we have ever known, and the greatest champion of freedom has ever brought help and comfort from the new world to the old."

His death, the 70-year-old British premier said in common words, was a "bitter loss to humanity," but coming on the eve of victory, it was "an enviable death."

USO Remodeling Progress Reported

Work on the USO remodeling program for the Arcade garage building is progressing well, according to Brennan and Cahoon, Marine Barracks contractors, who submitted the low bid for the remodeling plan. The men are now in their third week of work on the building, and hope to have it completed in four or five weeks.

Gestapo Building Bombed by RAF

LONDON, April 17 (AP)—Six RAF Mosquito bombers attacked at rooftop level level high explosive bombs through windows and doors of the Gestapo headquarters building at Oksene on Flyn island in Denmark today.

Pilots said the building was badly damaged by blast and fire. The planes, making a short trip from Belgian fields, carried two extra bombs under their wings. None was lost.

One Mosquito was from a RAF film unit and recorded the whole action. This was the third Gestapo headquarters smashed by Mosquitoes in Denmark in the last few months.

Pvt. Nires Awarded Purple Heart Medal

Pvt. Nick Nires of Klamath Falls has been awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in action on Luzon in January, 1945, according to word received here from Mrs. Nick Nires, now of Tionesta, Calif.

Nires was inducted into the US army in June, 1942, and was sent overseas in September, 1944. His wife, the former Mariel Smith of this city, and their young daughter are residing in Tionesta for the duration. Before Nires' induction, he was employed by various Klamath firms and at one time was with the J. J. Newberry company here.

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Formal End of European War May Be Months Away

LONDON, April 17 (AP)—A statement by Gen. Eisenhower that there will be no announcement of V-E Day "until all important enemy pockets on the western front have been wiped out" indicated today that the formal end of the war in Europe may be weeks, if not months, away.

The allied supreme commander told a group of American radio correspondents who visited an advanced command post yesterday that the war in Europe probably will not end until allied troops have occupied the reich completely.

Reiterates Belief
Reiterating his belief that there would not be a formal German surrender, Eisenhower added: "Nazi units, including divisions, corps, armies and finally army groups will give up separately as they exhaust their ammunition and gasoline, or load of linen when the sun is on the waxed hall floor, digging and breaking her left arm and injuring her back."

Possible Meaning
Eisenhower's statement might mean that no V-E day proclamation will be issued until after Adolf Hitler and his fanatical Nazi cohorts are routed from their mountain redoubt in Bavaria into which they are reportedly streaming for a death stand.

Military men have estimated that it may take months, to reduce Hitler's cragged fortress.

It must be remembered there are millions of men in Germany under arms. There are many no one knows. There are certainly enough to put down forces in the pocket at Stettin and North sea front. Stettin to Bremen, as well as in the Bavarian Alps.
