ler. The British surge toward Hamburg and to the Elbe carried within 35 miles of Luebeck on the southeast side of the Danish peninsula and 57 of the leading German naval base of Kiel. Hamburg was brought within light artillery range.

14th Advances
To the south, the 14th armored division crashed 25 miles southeast of Nuernberg in within five of Neumarkt, 75 miles north of Munich and 120 from Hitler's Bavarian citadel at Berchtesgaden.

Supreme headquarters connected an earlier statement that the Americans had fought in the center of Nuernberg, saying late in the day that actually the third and 45th divisions had linked up outside the city.

Off to the southwest of Nuernberg, the Heilich (12th armored) division reached the Franconische Rezat river in a 17-mile dash to within 60 of Augsburg, Bavaria city of 185,000.

WASHINGTON, April 19 (AP)—President Truman sent his first veto message to congress today, disapproving a bill he had signed as part of his routine duties as vice president.
