

HAPLIN LOVE AFFAIR COSTS OVER \$100,000

LOS ANGELES, April 19 (AP)—The love affair of the red-haired Joan Berry with the blond-haired Charles E. Chaplin is estimated to have cost her more than \$100,000.

The mercury-haired little woman of the films was ordered by the superior court yesterday to pay \$75 a week for support of Joan's 18-month-old daughter until she is 21—another \$76,050.

The jury the day before ruled that the child is Baby Carol Ann's daughter.

The 56-year-old actor-producer directed also to pay Joan's lawyers \$5000 in addition to the \$75 he paid her previous week.

The \$75 a week for Carol Ann what he has been paying voluntarily since last June.

And there was \$11,000 he had set over for medical care and other expenses pending a decision after Joan, his movie-star drama pupil, filed her suit. In it the comedian testified that he and Joan had used their intimacies months before Carol Ann was conceived.

Joan's attorney in the paternity suit, Joseph Scott, told reporters yesterday's assessments against the Chaplin fortune.

He had argued that \$75 a week is "a pauper's program for a child."

Chaplin's attorney, Charles E. Hilkman, declined to say whether he might ask a retrial or appeal.

WOMAN CHARGED WITH MAIL FRAUD

FREEMONT, Ill., April 19 (AP)—Federal charges of using the mails to defraud were placed against a 47-year-old woman here yesterday in an indictment which said she obtained money from a young soldier she had never seen by claiming she was the mother and he the father of two "test tube" babies that never existed.

The indictment said the woman, Mrs. Garnette J. Knighton, obtained the soldier's name through an Aberdeen, Wash., lonely hearts club and began correspondence with him at his camp in California.

She represented herself as a 24-year-old woman and "something to look at" the indictment alleged, and induced the soldier to become a party to a "test tube" baby experiment via the mails.

The indictment also alleged she wrote the soldier that she had given birth to a girl in 1942 and a boy the following year as a result of the experiments and that she induced him to allot her part of his pay.

SHIPYARDS, PLANE PLANTS PLAN LAYOFF

LOS ANGELES, April 19 (AP)—West coast shipyards and airplane factories will lay off 100,000 workers within the next 90 days because of cutbacks and contract terminations, Glenn Brockway, deputy regional director for the war manpower commission, predicted yesterday.

Brockway and Fay W. Hunter, regional director, addressing WMC directors of Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Arizona and Alaska meeting here, called for a reemployment program to cushion the layoffs.

A. F. Hardy, Washington state manpower director, said the Seattle area was not included in that Brockway's figures were for other parts of the coast.

Hardy said there were "no contemplated cutbacks at the present time in the Seattle area."

Do you know this about Produce?

When you serve fresh vegetables, properly prepared, you are providing your family with required vitamins ... using foods in plentiful supply, and best of all, offering them delicious, delicate flavor obtainable in no other way. Here are some tips on vegetable cookery that will pay you dividends in ease of preparation as well as flavor.

For strong-flavored vegetables, such as onions, cauliflower, etc., use sufficient boiling salted water to cover the vegetable; cook uncovered, drain, and discard cooking water, for it contains disagreeable sulphur compounds.

For spinach, Swiss chard, and other leafy greens, lift washed leaves into a large saucepan containing 1 to 2 cups rapidly boiling salted water, and cook rapidly, uncovered, turning greens once or twice with fork and spoon. Cook until barely tender. Drain and discard water, for it contains objectionable compounds of oxalic acid. Season to taste with butter or margarine, salt and pepper, and serve garnished with lemon wedges.

For red cabbage and beets, cook in small amount of boiling water to which 1/2 teaspoon vinegar or lemon juice for each cup shredded vegetable has been added, in order to retain bright red color.

Panning vegetables: This method of cooking vegetables in a covered pan with a minimum amount of water—just enough to produce steam—is excellent for nearly all green and succulent vegetables. Shred, dice, or cut vegetable fine. Into a shallow pan with tight-fitting cover put 1/2 to 3/4 cup water, add 1 to 2 tablespoons butter, margarine, oil, or bacon or ham fryings, and heat to boiling. Add the freshly shredded vegetable, (3 to 6 cups), salt lightly, cover tightly, and cook until barely tender, but still slightly crisp—5 to 20 minutes will be ample for most vegetables. Amount of water and shortening and time of cooking will depend upon the kind and amount of vegetable, and on the type of utensil. Less water will be needed when a heavy saucepan is used, as in so-called "waterless cooking". Water should be practically all cooked away when vegetable is done.
