KENT PROMOTED

15TH AAF IN ITALY—Earl B. Kent, 23, of 737 Pacific Terrace, was recently promoted to the rank of first lieutenant, it was announced by 15th Army Air Force headquarters.

An aerial navigator, Lt. Kent is a member of a veteran bomber squadron that has flown more than 200 long-range missions in the allied air drive to spike German industry in southern Europe.

A graduate of KUHS in 1939, Lt. Kent was a student at Oregon State college when he entered the air corps on May 12, 1942. He was commissioned on July 24, 1944, and he was last stationed in the United States at Boise, Ida.

MORGAN ILL

William Morgan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Muri Morgan, who live on the Spencer place below Ellingson mill, has recently been discharged from a hospital in France and expects to join his company again soon, somewhere in Germany. PFC Morgan is in the signal corps. According to relatives, he was ill in the hospital almost a month.

Morgan had been in combat before his illness. He entered the service in October, 1942, and was sent overseas in December, 1943.

GOELLERS VOLUNTEER

With the U. S. naval hospital at Aiea Heights on Oahu, Hawaiian Islands, filled to capacity with casualties from Iwo Jima, a large number of Waves volunteer for three hours' extra duty several nights a week in addition to the full day's work they put in at their own job.

Two sisters who are contributing some of their own leisure time to the work are Nan Goeller, storekeeper first class, and Adra Goeller, seaman first class, both of 125 Pine in Klamath Falls.

The original plan of officers at Wave barracks in Pearl Harbor was to ask for volunteers for one evening a week to help out with the peak load of work placed on corporals at the hospital during the emergency. Many of the girls who volunteered the first evening, came back the next evening, too, and asked to be assigned to the same wards that they had worked before.

They write letters for patients and read to them. They make the rounds of the wards with pitchers of water and fruit juice. They work in the linen room, folding piles of linen which have stacked up after the day's laundry operation. And oftentimes, at the request of the patient, they just sit and talk about home.

One evening, for instance, a small group of Waves working in the linen room, folded 1500 bath towels, 4000 pajamas, 600 blankets and nearly 1000 hand towels.

WALKER VISITS

S/Sgt. Virgil Walker, son of Mrs. Ruth M. Walker of Sprague River, visited here with his sister, Mrs. Charlotte Schatz, 5642 S. 6th, while he was home on a recent furlough.

He has reported to Lincoln, Neb., for reassignment. Sgt. Walker served three months overseas, completing 35 missions as an air mechanic and gunner from a base in England. He returned from overseas last fall and has been taking refresher courses in Texas and Arizona.

He attended schools in Tulelake and was employed in agriculture there before entering the service in 1941.
