### Cooper, Ingram Given Service Awards

NEW YORK, April 21 (AP)—Kent Cooper, executive director of The Associated Press, and Admiral Jonas H. Ingram, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, are recipients of distinguished service awards from the sons of Indiana of New York.

Presentation of the awards, made annually to the organization's members who have rendered the most outstanding and distinguished service during the year, was made last night.  
A citation to Cooper, who is a native of Columbus, Ind., termed him "the world's managing editor" and said he was honored for his "fight for freedom of the press, not only in this country but throughout the world."  
Ingram, native of Jefferson, Ind., was cited as "the outstanding hoosier in military affairs."

### Paper Vetoes Plan For GI Representation

PARIS, April 21 (AP)—The army newspaper Stars and Stripes today vetoed a suggestion by Senator Magnuson (D. Wash.) that it select a combat soldier to represent the GIs at the world security conference in San Francisco.

"The typical GI... would be a two-headed calf at a world conference for dignified study of a confusing situation," the newspaper said, adding that the soldier would be wine, dined and flattered but would be completely bewildered by the complexity of the problems to be examined.  
America's eight trained delegates are competent to represent soldier opinion as well as the rest of the nation, the paper said, "and that's good enough for us."

Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's third army captured Aesch, Czechoslovak stronghold 60 miles from the Nazis' last big arsenal at Pilsen. Other third army forces were only 58 miles from that site at the Skoda Munitions works.

tions of us have died so far since this war began. Killing all of us will be a long and wearing and bloody job—a bigger and bloodier and more terrible job than your foolish American sensibilities can stand. So you'd better call it off now and let us keep what we have left out of what we have stolen."

### SUCH are the fruits of bad leadership. Bad leadership PLUS INDOCTRINATION in savagery, indoctrination begun in infancy and carried through to maturity.

### UNLESS the world is to go down, down, down into another Dark Age, we must find the ANTIDOTE for this fearful power for evil.

The antidote lies in GOOD leadership, sound leadership, wise leadership.

That is what we MUST have in the pregnant years that lie ahead of us.

Without it, the world can't be snatched back from the precipice that yawns ahead.

### FOR too many years, we Americans have been far too careless in our choice of leaders. Men who are qualified to lead have stayed out of politics. The job of running for office has been left too often to the mouthy demagogues.

In this emergency that has arisen to confront us, we have been luckier than we have any right to be. The general run of our leadership has risen to the occasion in the traditional American manner, and so we have been saved from the consequence of our negligence.

But we mustn't take any more chances. We must choose as our leaders from here on the best that we have, and we must give to them a quality of loyalty and tolerance in our support of them far above what we have exhibited in the past.

The world situation today is too grave to justify any other course.

### Lily Bulbs Bring Riches, Report

PORTLAND, April 21 (AP)—Oregon's "gold coast" in Curry county now yields hitherto unsuspected riches—lily bulbs which have brought some growers \$20,000 for one acre, a Port Orford banker said here.

John R. Ross said the war had resulted in huge profits on bulbs, which sell for an average of \$1 each. Port Orford residents are planting lily bulbs—instead of victory gardens—in their yards, he reported.

Some tinhaters from Portland, foreseeing an end to the shipyard boom, have purchased land in Curry county, Ross said. He stated that Oregon-grown bulbs are now judged superior to the Japanese varieties imported before the war.

# British Open New Drive in Burma

CALCUTTA, April 21 (AP)—The British have opened a strong new campaign to drive the Japanese from southern Burma. A 70-mile thrust south of Meiktila has carried to within 214 miles of the capital seaport of Rangoon, it was announced last night.

A 14th army spearhead lunged down the main Burma railway line to a few miles north of Ywinnana.

The advancing British killed 3500 Japanese.

### West Must Look to Orient for Markets, Asserts Gov. Wallgren

RENO, Nev., April 21 (AP)—The western United States, with the possibility of shrinking postwar population and consuming power and a huge industrial plant left from the war, must look toward the Orient for markets to keep itself industrially alive, Gov. Mon C. Wallgren of Washington said in a speech at the Western Governors' conference today.

Wallgren assailed tariff walls which grew up during the period between the two wars saying "removal of artificial obstructions is necessary if trade is to flow."
