

BUDGET CUT, VERBAL SLAMS GIVEN BUREAU

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—The house appropriations committee tossed a handful of verbal brickbats and a 25 per cent budget cut at the interior department today.

Sending to the floor a \$102,602,628 measure to finance the department for the year starting July 1, the committee criticized many of the agency's activities and trimmed \$38,743,419 from its budget estimates.

However, the amount it recommended exceeds by \$4,460,629 the funds made available to the department for the current year. The increase, the committee said, was due to the necessity for furnishing reclamation projects more money to spur food production.

The committee's formal report, prepared by a sub-committee headed by Rep. Johnson (D-Okla.), a long-time critic of Interior Secretary Ickes, expressed hope that within a few years the department's revenues would equal operating expenses. Its income next year was estimated at \$74,500,000.

The committee continued in effect a sharp restriction on the department's expenditures for long-distance telephone calls and telegrams. Johnson said during the lengthy hearing on the bill that the only collect telegram the department "found necessary to send to a member of congress" was one sent to him.

The incident went unexplained after Johnson asked interior officials whether it was merely a coincidence or whether the department wanted "to call attention to the fact" that it "resented" what they considered had been "discrimination against them."

The committee turned down a request for \$1,072,000 to finance an Alaskan development study commenting that it would be of "little or no practical value."

Help, Help, Go Get Elmer Outa' There!

'Elmer' Rescued 600 Times By Naval Air Station Crew

"Elmer" is rescued again! And who is "Elmer"? He is a very important personage to the mobile crash rescue unit that has been demonstrating fire fighting and rescue procedure at the Klamath naval air station for the past two weeks. "Elmer" serves as the dummy victim who is rescued several times a day from the flaming cockpit of a discarded fuselage that is used to simulate actual crash conditions.

Lt. (jg) M. K. Ray and six specialists F, who previously served as instructors at Bu-Ships fire fighting schools, make up the mobile crash fire rescue unit that has been touring the 13th naval district since February 1.

The purpose of this mobile unit is to explain and demonstrate to the personnel connected with the fire and rescue work of each station the proper method of obtaining split second control of burning wreckage and how to rescue a pilot and crew as fast as possible.

The group is equipped with a Bean FFN3 crash truck with a built-in foam unit. It can produce fog by releasing water under 800 pounds per square inch pressure through special adjustable nozzles. Properly applied, fog will protect the cockpit areas from flames. They also have a LaFrance CO2 booster line crash truck adapted to produce foam. It holds 320 gallons of foam. Foam, used correctly,

blankets out oxygen from the area of combustion and smothers fire.

After demonstrations the personnel taking the course is allowed to go ahead and practice under the guiding eye of the instructors. At the end of the five-day course they are able to conduct a split-second rescue unaided.

The crash gang operates as a team. Although all of them are trained drivers each has a specialized task to perform in a rescue. They all must be familiar with the structural features of all types of naval aircraft. Especially important is knowing the location of gasoline

tanks, escape hatches and the position of guns and other armament. In some of their practice runs the crew has had the water trained on the cockpit in 15 seconds after the alarm is sounded and in 27 seconds they can have the pilot rescued and the fire under control.

The instructors are all former members of their home town fire departments. Lt. (jg) Ray is a former officer with the Evansville, Ind., fire department. Instructors in the group demonstrating here include John Kokoska Sp (F) 2c, (the leading petty officer) from Stanford, Conn.; Arthur Ventrice Sp (F) 2c, Bergenfield, N. J.; Howard Faulk Sp (F) 3c, Columbus, O.; and Joseph Mackey Sp (F) 3c, Frank McKay Sp (F) 3c, and Jack Armstrong Sp (F) 3c, who are all from New York. There is always a pharmacist

mate in attendance at the rescue training. Harold G. Dwelle PhMSc has been assisting the unit here.

Incidentally "Elmer" has been rescued over 600 times with no serious injury resulting to his benefactors.

SENATE EYES PARTY LABEL ELIMINATION

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 24 (AP)—The elimination of party labels in all California state offices, save those of governor and lieutenant governor, appeared today assured of quick passage in the senate.

At the same time, prospects for speedy disposal of the knotty tax problem which has deadlocked the legislature for much of its session appeared dimmer than ever.

Senate approval yesterday of an amendment to a bill for a nonpartisan state officers extended the measure to cover the legislature as well, leaving only the top two executive positions under party standards.

The action seemed to presage passage of the measure on its third reading, possibly today, when the bill is returned from the printer and restored to the senate calendar.

The administration tax measure, from which the assembly recently stripped a rider earmarking \$57,000,000 for city and county subsidies, received another setback in its rocky legisla-

tive journey when a demagogic caucus last night voted to tempt final roll call on legislation until the governor's 100,000 biennial budget is considered and V.E. day is claimed.
