Giant Jupiter Now Greatest In Luminosity, Says Pruett

Brilliantly glowing high in the southeast, is now a most splendid object in the darkening evening sky. By far the largest in actual size of all the worlds which encircle the sun, this giant planet is now also approximately at its greatest apparent luminosity. All spring and summer it will be visible as our bright "evening star."

Jupiter is an attractive sight in a telescope, even a small one. The yellow globe is streaked with faint gray bands, parallel in general to its equator. Then the four larger moons, floating in the open sky "offshore" from the planet itself, furnish in their daily changes of position a never ending interest to the

DOGS NOT TO RUN AT LARGE IN CITY

All dogs inside the city limits of Klamath Falls must not be allowed to run at large during the months of May and June, according to Amos Fields, poundmaster. There is a city ordinance which forbids dog owners allowing their animals to run loose at this time, he said, and no excuses by owners will be accepted.

Any dogs not properly restrained will be picked up and the owner will be arrested, he stated. Purpose of this ordinance is to prevent dogs from doing serious damage to gardens, shrubbery and spring flowers.

A handling charge at the city pound will also be assessed against any dog owner who violates this ordinance and whose dog is picked up, Fields said.

Meeting Called to Oppose Referendums

PORTLAND, April 25 (AP)—A meeting to oppose referendums against legislation limiting commercial fishing in Oregon coastal streams has been called for Eugene Saturday.

C. C. Schenck, president of the Oregon Wildlife Federation, said representatives of Grange, Farmers Union and Labor will be invited. The Siletz river fishermen's union has filed preliminary referendum petitions against the new act limiting fishing.

WARRANT ASKED IN SLAYING OF CHILD

SEATTLE, April 25 (AP)—Detective Capt. James C. Lawrence asked the prosecutor's office today to issue a first degree murder warrant for the arrest of a 29-year-old Indian for the sex-slaying of 5-year-old Irma Irene McGough last Sunday.

The man, whom Lawrence identified as an ex-convict with a record of sex degeneracy, has been the primary suspect in the case since the little girl's body was found Monday afternoon stuffed in a pile of mattresses in a salvage depot.

Captain Lawrence, head of the homicide detail, said he considers the evidence conclusive, but that exhaustive searching had failed to find the suspect. He was reported to have been taking meals at the salvage center where the victim's family had been given temporary housing.

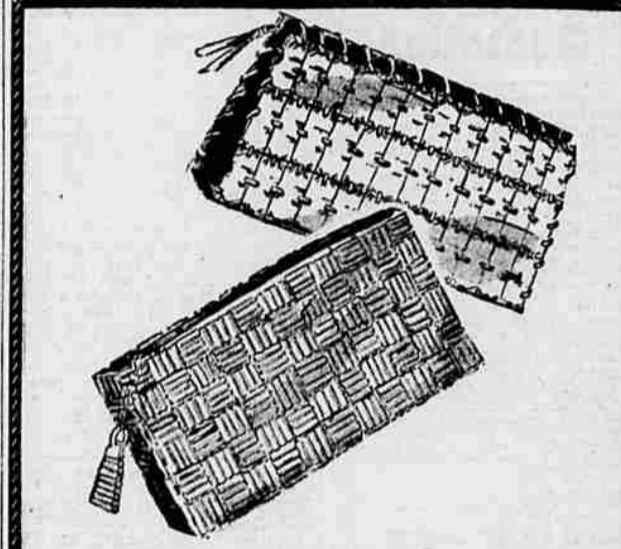
