Money Allotted For Indian Land Drainage

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—Appropriations of about \$2,300,000, approximately \$250,000 more than allowed last year, were recommended today for irrigation and drainage on Indian lands.

The interior appropriation bill, introduced today, carries the following allotments: (1945 appropriations where available in parentheses): Oregon: Klamath, \$6575 (\$7,690).

LION COMMENDS CLOTHING DRIVE

A letter received by the Klamath Lions club from Sgt. William Milne, a member now somewhere in the French front, commends the united national clothing drive.

The houses in the French villages are all wrecked, he writes, and the Germans stole everything they could carry away, wrecking what they couldn't.

There is nothing for sale in the few stores left and people may only buy one pair of shoes a year—when they can get them.

Seven ragged, dirty children, all from one family, hang around the place and help the American soldiers eat their dinner. The kids gulp the food, the bread seeming like cake to them. The boy re-named Snuffy had things on his feet you couldn't call shoes.

One of the men cut soles out of wood, put some leather uppers on them and gave him some shoes. Snuffy sat all day just looking at them.

"If we could take care of these poor kids now, Milne observes, 'and show them the right way to live, we could stop all future wars, so please, fellows, get behind this clothing drive in earnest.'"

The drive closes April 30 and bundles may be left at the central depot, 1415 Main, or at various downtown stores.

Sunday at 9:45 a. m., trucks will be driven about the residential districts, picking up clothing bundles from the curbs.

The War At a Glance

The Western front: Third army drove to within 11 miles of the Austrian frontier, 72 of Berchtesgaden; seventh and French first moved to encircle Munich; British battled in Brenne; advanced on Hamburg; Canadians four miles from Emden; Americans in center awaited juncture with Russians.

The Russian front: Soviet troops swarmed across the Elbe river at point 22 miles or less from American positions on the Mulde; battle for Berlin raged on as encirclement was completed by two Soviet armies; 500,000 nazis believed inside ring.

The Italian front: Parma, Reggio d'Emilia fell; Germans reported fleeing in confusion toward homeland redoubt with allies in swift pursuit.

The Pacific front: Americans have broken into second defense ring on southern Okinawa; battle raged for Baguio on Luzon; Mindanao drive neared decisive stage; Superforts bombed Shikoku, home Japanese island, for first time.
