

# Oregon Fishing Outlook Shows Wide Variation

Good Fishing Reported In Klamath River; Lake County Conditions Poor

PORTLAND, April 28 (AP)—Oregon's fishing prospects this weekend will show wide variation, state police reports indicate today, ranging from very good in some spots to poor in others.

Alsea river in Lincoln county is warming with cutthroats, poacher and limits of salmon trout are being caught in the county streams. State Game Supervisor Frank B. Wire had good luck with cutthroats on the Nectuxa river, where he caught 14 trout from 10 to 17 inches long.

"Cuts" Avoid Usual Haunts. Wire, who reported the "cuts" were their usual haunts under rocks, made most of his catch in a stream or along shore on current breaks.

Other angling reports from the police: Klamath river—Lake county—very poor. Baker county—fair. Jefferson county—fair. Metolitus river. Josephine county—chinooks being taken in Rogue near Grants Pass. Marion county—Santiam river high. Mill and Beaver creeks fair. Douglas county—some chinooks in North Umpqua river. Limit catches of small rainbows and cutthroats. Lane county—dubious.

Portland Downs Oaks, 3-1; Angels Win, Seattle Idle

Los Angeles pulled Sacramento into a three-way tie for fifth by downing the Solons, 12-9, in a slugfest match which featured four homers. The circuit blows—two of them by Mel Nicks—accounted for 10 runs.

At Portland Ad Liska limited the Acorns to four scattered hits to record his fifth win in seven starts.

Padres Whip Seals  
Wensloff yielded nine hits in the San Diego-San Francisco game but struck out 10 batters in pulling himself out of some tight spots. The game-winning blow was by Lou Vizzich who drove in two in the sixth with a sharp single.

Sacramento's loss to the Angels was its third straight in four games; one of the lusty Angel homers was by Lou (Mad Russian) Novikov in the sixth with the bags filled.

## Lidman Romps To Victory In Hurdles

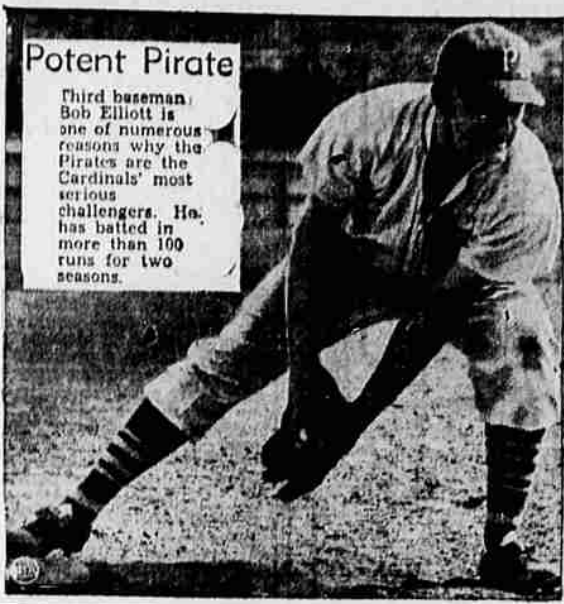
PHILADELPHIA, April 28 (AP)—Gunder Haegg, fleet Swedish middle distance runner winds up an American tour today in a special one-mile handicap, feature of the 51st annual Penn relay carnival.

But the speedy necktie salesman almost took part in an unannounced race yesterday. Here to watch his countryman, Haakon Lidman, romp to victory in the 120-high hurdles, Haegg inquired about entering the two-mile run.

The chilly air which held the opening day crowd to less than 5000 finally decided Haegg against competing and John Kahl of Cornell won the event, with Donal O'Leary, U. S. coast guardsman in second place.

Lidman's feat of covering the hurdle course in 14.4 seconds—one-tenth of a second off the carnival record—was the highlight of yesterday's opener.

## Giants Rap Bums; Cubs Edge Bucs

Voiselle Blanks Brooklyn Nine; Derringer Wins, 7-3

Ernie Lombardi beat out a bunt!

That astonishing effort sums up the spirit of the 1945 New York Giants and points out one of the main reasons Mel Ott's gang is on top of the National league heap.

Lombardi's bunt was incidental to a 5-0 victory over Brooklyn as Sophomore Bill Voiselle earned his third decision. Four hits by Steve Fillipowicz, including a homer, and Mel Ott's third round-tripper did the job.

Ott has the Giants believing in themselves and they are looking tougher every day although the big test by the powerful western teams still is to come.

Chicago Strong Threat  
Chicago, with whom the Polo Grounds battled for fourth place during the last months of the '44 campaign, is the strongest threat at the moment on some unexpectedly fine pitching.

Paul Derringer's return to form appeared one of the most significant developments of the first two weeks. When the experienced righthander turned back Pittsburgh, 7-3, it was his third straight victory and fifth in a row for the second-place Cubs.

Reds Edge Cards, 2-1  
Dain Clay did the hitting and Ed Heusser did the pitching in Cincinnati's 2-1 edge over the world champion St. Louis Cards. Clay drove in both tallies, scoring Heusser with a game-winning double in the seventh to beat Ted Wilks.

Frankie Crosetti's pinch homer with two on the eighth, his first appearance of the year, wasn't enough to save the New York Yankees who fell before Washington's Mickey Haefner, 6-4. George Myatt of the Senators hammered out four hits and stole three bases to help trim Floyd Bevens.

A's Drop Boston  
Russ Christopher of the Philadelphia A's joined the three-win pitching club by pinning back the ears of Boston, 3-3. It was the eighth successive setback for the Red Sox who were only five games away from the all-time record.

Detroit at Cleveland in the American and Philadelphia at Boston in the National were postponed and the other clubs were not scheduled.

When this appears, the meet will be practically over. Elimination events are run in the morning with the finals being held in the afternoon.

Dave Henthorne will undoubtedly anchor the Pelicans in all relay events in which he is entered. Ben DeVore will heave the discus, Jim Palmer will handle the pole vault along with several other capable KUHS entries, and lanky Jim Pope will endeavor to annex the crown in the high and low hurdles.
