Essay Winners

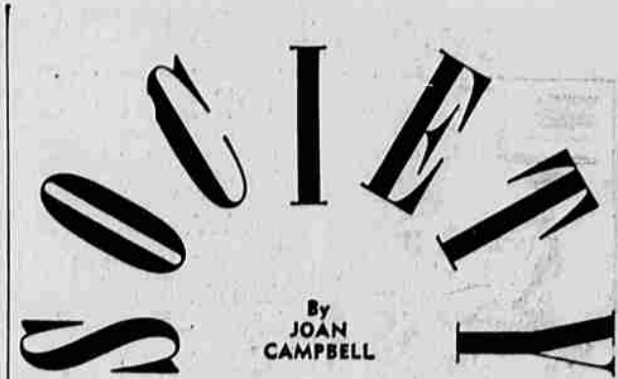
