

# KUHS Cindermen Capture First in Annual Meet

## Dave Henthorne Breaks Local Track Record in 440 With Time of 50.4

Coach Paul Deller's Klamath Union high school track team spread-eagled the field of 11 entries Saturday afternoon in the 14th running of the annual southern Oregon-northern California meet at Modoc field.

Paced by the slashing spikes of Dave Henthorne, the Pelican cindermen amassed 76 1/2 points while Medford placed second with 50 1/2 tallies and Ashland annexed third place with 45 1/2 markers.

Henthorne personally accounted for 15 1/2 points to take individual high scoring honors for the meet while lanky Jim Pope garnered 14 1/2 points for runner-up position in scoring.

**Seis 440 Record**

The Klamath speed merchant broke the tape in the 100-yard dash with the time of 10 seconds flat, which is the fastest time recorded so far this year in the state. He then went on to win new laurels by breaking the local record in the 440-yard dash with the time of 50.4 seconds. The previous record was 51.5 seconds set by Johnson of Medford.

in 1940. This mark established by the Klamath comet is also the third fastest time recorded in high school competition in the state.

Pope turned on plenty of speed to capture first place in the 120-yard high hurdles and 200-yard low hurdles. He ran the first event in 18.1 and the second in 24.6. He also tied for first place in the high jump with Brown of Grants Pass.

With Henthorne running in the anchor position, the Red-and-White of KUHS out-distanced other competitors in the half-mile relay. Grants Pass placed second in this event and Medford third. The Klamath team was composed of two freshmen and two seniors, Tommy Edwards and Bob Dodson, Bud Biehn and Henthorne.

Jim Palmer of Klamath tied for the top slot in the pole vault event with Thompson of Ashland with a jump of 10 feet, 6 inches, and Johnny Foster copped first place in the shot with a heave of 40 feet, 11 inches.

In the broad jump event, Henthorne again landed in the mon-

ey by winning second honors behind Carter of Medford.

This is the third successive year that the Klamath Falls trackmen have annexed the crown in this meet and their victory Saturday gives KUHS possession of the trophy for another year which is donated by the Lions club to the victor.

With this significant triumph added to their imposing record, the Pelicans now point toward the district meet to be held at Medford Saturday.

# Yanks Split Double Bill With Solons

## Russ Derby Slaps Second Grand Slam Circuit Circuit

Russ Derry may be only a flash in the pan but if he maintains his present pace, he is certain to set a new record for grand slam homers in one season.

The Yankee outfielder, starting his first regular season in the majors, (he played in 38 games last year), belied his second homer with the bases full yesterday as the New Yorkers split a double header with Washington, winning the first 13-4 and losing the second 2-1 before 33,308 fans.

The record of four in a season is held jointly by Frank Schulte of the Chicago Cubs, Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, Yankees; and Rudy York, Detroit Tigers. None hit his first until well into May.

**Slams Two Homers**

In addition to his base clearing wallop, the Mill Grove, Mo., farmer hit another homer in the opener, making it the second time this season that he has hit two home runs in one game.

Homer hitting is nothing new to the 27-year-old Irishman as he led the Piedmont league in 1939 with 40 homers for Norfolk, Va., and banged out 22 for Newark in 1942.

The opener marked the third win without a defeat for New York's Hank Borowy, but Atley Donald, despite a personal homer, bowed to the Nats' Roger Wolf in a second game mound duel with each team making only four hits.

**White Sox Drops Two**

The surprising Chicago White Sox finally lost after five straight victories, when they were beaten twice by St. Louis 3-2 and 10-4. Oddly, it was the Sox who ended the Browns opening season winning streak at nine last year. Bob Muncreif made his first appearance for the Sewellmen, in relief, and bested Thornton Lee in the opener, Frank Mancuso's ninth inning triple and a long fly by Pinch Hitter Gene Moore accounted for the deciding run in the opener. Jack Kramer, relieving Al Hollingsworth, got credit for the second as Vern Stephens who homered in the opener, paced the Browns with three hits and two RBIs.

**Tigers Split With Indians**

Detroit and Cleveland exchanged 4-0 shutouts, the Indians behind Steve Gromek, winning and the Tigers, with Dizzy Trout, hurling his third win and his second shutout, winning the second. Trout aided his own cause with a home run.

Finding the formula last Saturday, the Boston Red Sox continued to win, taking both ends of a twin-bill from the Philadelphia Athletics 2-0 and 6-3 in 13 innings. Dave Ferriss, recently discharged from the army air force, made a brilliant debut, blanking the A's in the opener with five hits while the veteran Bob Johnson paced the Sox in the nightcap, his two-run homer tying the score in the ninth and his fly accounting for one of the winning runs in the 13th.

**Cards Rap Reds Twice**

With Aces Max Lanier and Mort Cooper in the box, the St. Louis Cardinals took two games from Cincinnati 2-1 and 8-3.

Pittsburgh avenged its four straight defeats by Chicago by trouncing the Cubs twice 6-2 and 5-4, not only ending its own five-game losing streak but snapping the Bruins six-game winning skein.

Dixie Walker's three-run homer in the eighth enabled Brooklyn to defeat the New York Giants for the second straight time by a 4-3 score as Hal Gregg held the Giants to four hits.

The Boston Braves and Philadelphia Phillies split their two games, the Phils winning the opener 5-3 and the Braves behind Al Javery copping the second 1-0.

**Dumler Wins 8th Game**

San Diego's rise was highlighted by Carl Dumler's eighth 18th victory. He won Sunday's first game, Volie Eaves recorded his third triumph over the Seals in a week in the second game.
