

BOARD SEEKS ARRESTS FOR PARK DAMAGE

At a meeting of the park board Monday afternoon considerable damage being willfully done to the park property. Upon one occasion the fence around the tennis courts at the park was damaged and there have also been incidents of deliberate destruction of the rest room facilities there.

The board authorized the caretaker at Moore park to arrest any person seen deliberately and willfully destroying or damaging park property.

A speed limit of 15 miles per hour in Moore park has been established frequently by motorists and the caretaker was also authorized to make arrests for violation of this speed limit.

There have also been several instances of persons leaving broken glass on the premises. There are placards for bottles and other articles at the park and any person apprehended breaking a bottle and leaving glass strewn on the grounds will be placed under arrest, it was stated.

AID OFFERED SLAUGHTERERS TO REGISTER

The local war price and rationing board is prepared to expedite the registration of meat slaughterers who offered for sale less than 6000 pounds during the year of 1944, Chairman Percy Murray announced yesterday.

The new OPA provision, part of a joint action by the office of economic stabilization, the war food administration, the war department and the office of price administration, is aimed to accomplish a more equitable distribution of meat for civilians and to stamp out black markets.

By bringing the 1,080,000 American farmers who sell their

slaughtered meat in small amounts under accountable regulations, and to encourage non-federally inspected slaughterers to come within the provisions permitting the shipments of their meat across state borders, the OPA believes that much of the current shortages can be solved, Murray said.

The small and independent slaughterer has represented a large quota of uncontrolled meat, and this new control offers both the legitimate slaughterer and the consumer adequate protection against illicit diversion of the commodity.
