

JAP REVERSES INFLICTED ON ALL SECTORS

The Japs, reaching for our 14th airforce base at Chikisang (only 70 miles away) got snarled by the Chinese whose troops appear better trained and armed than usual, and are driven back.

WITH Europe filling the headlines, we're merely glanced at the Pacific war for the past week. WATCH IT. Big things are in the making in the Pacific. We'll give the little yellow men no rest from here on.

OPA Rules On Ads For Used Cars

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—The OPA ruled today that newspaper advertisements of used cars for sale must list the price and specify that it is "within OPA ceiling."

In a move to tighten enforcement of price ceilings on these vehicles, the agency stipulated that beginning May 9 each ad in newspapers or other publications also must include:

- The make of car, model year and body type.
- The regulation applies to private owners as well as dealers.
- OPA at the same time exempted from price control all used cars of model year 1935 or earlier.

The rule is often called a "singing fish." A peculiar humming noise is made by its air bladder.

Confirm Suicide

Izvestia's correspondent said: "I have been asking the question 'Where is Hitler?' of German prisoners. They all answer: Hitler and Goebbels committed suicide."

Looting was rampant. There was no way of telling what the population of Berlin was at the moment, but unofficial estimates put it at not much under 5,000,000 for the metropolitan area.

Nazis Clear Streets

The red army set up army bakeries for the people and put thousands of prisoners to work clearing the streets.

Red Star Correspondents Lt. Col. Leonid Vysokostrovsky and Pavel Trovansky gave graphic pictures of Berlin after the surrender.

Ruins craters smashed streets, street cars on their sides, fresh graves. German bodies still not buried, white flags, throngs of gloomy, starving inhabitants. Such is Berlin today," they wrote.
