A total of 213,467 one hundred pound bags of certified potato seed were tagged in Klamath county for 1944. There were 182,384 bags of certified White Rose tagged for seed during the year; 43,903 of Netted Gems; 6800 of Burbanks and 600 of Katahdins.

It is anticipated by the county agent's office that acreage for certified seed for 1945 will compare with that for 1944. Last year the acreage was 1800 acres, about 10 per cent of the total potato acreage for the county.

ANCIENT MARINER ENDS MONEY SPREE

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—The ancient mariner of Sailor's Snug harbor, 100-year-old William Samuel Clark, was back home today after a spending spree of nearly four weeks which would have taxed the energies of a 15-year-old.

Clark had been gone from the seamen's home on Staten Island since April 7.

Last night Patrolman James Kehoe found the salty centenarian in a restaurant with only 50 cents in his jeans and quite willing to return to Sailor's Snug harbor "where everything is free."

Clark, who in a lifetime of sailing had never had a good look at New York, confided that the Bowery had been his base of operations and from there he went on sight-seeing tours, visiting motion picture palaces, museums and department stores while running through a \$100 windfall he received for recounting his experiences on a radio program.

Clark also said he did a grand tour of waterfront taverns where he told husky young seamen of today how he heard Abraham Lincoln speak on several occasions.
