

# Special Hospitality Accorded Waves, Nurses Stationed at Air Station, Barracks

JOAN CAMPBELL has been turned over to the "girls in blue," who use it for card parties and other forms of entertainment. The Waves also have been invited to sking parties to Fort Klamath during the winter months, and they are to be the guests of the Klamath tribe on the Klamath Indian reservation for a picnic in the near future. Another form of relaxation is found in a bowling team which has been organized, and the Waves compete against groups from Klamath Falls.

All types of outings, picnics, camping trips, fishing, swimming and sports head the list of activities in which the Waves are particularly interested. They are especially anxious to find owners of lake homes who would be willing to let them use the beach on their property. Many of the Waves are also interested in riding horseback—some have rented horses at various stables, but want to plan an overnight camping trip, and would therefore like to find a ranch where horses would be available for use for this length of time. Still others like to play golf, but have no means of transportation, and would be glad to meet golf club members downtown who could give them a ride to the course.

**Miss Weekend Fun**  
However, many of the girls would like to make their plans for any day other than Sunday, as a number of them are on duty at that time. Since their liberties fall only on week days, they miss the affairs that are planned for Saturdays and Sundays.

The only service women at the Marine Barracks are the 13 navy nurses that are on duty in the dispensary. None of these women are from Oregon, most of them coming here from the mid-western states or the east coast.

**Resigned**  
There is one full lieutenant, nine Lt. (j.g.)'s and three ensigns stationed at the Barracks at the present time. The lieutenant, Mrs. Mitchell Paige, has resigned her commission in the navy nurse corps, but is still included on the roster. Lt. (j.g.) Katherine Harkins is now acting chief nurse in place of Mrs. Paige.

The women live in one wing of the BOQ. Their quarters might almost be considered luxurious in comparison with living facilities on other posts. Two nurses share a room, and they have the privilege of using the lounges at the BOQ, as well as eating their meals at the officer's mess.

Because nurses are running on a crowded schedule, they are not seriously affected by the seeming lack of hospitality on the part of the townspeople. There are usually a number of parties, dances and teas given at the Marine Barracks, as well as the usual shows at the post theatre. The social life of the nurse is full to overflowing, and she never lacks enough dates with eligible marine officers.

One of the greatest complaints of the nurses at this installation is that they don't have enough to do if placed on ward duty. Those assigned to the family clinic or maternity ward enjoy their work, because most of them have had previous training in that line.

All of the women of the United States navy have voluntarily given up the freedom of civilian life to perform a patriotic duty for their country. They deserve credit and admiration for the obligation they have fulfilled.
