

Klamath To Join In Prayer For War Dead In V-E Day Program

Klamath Falls will join the nation in prayer Sunday, May 13, officially dedicated as a day of prayer for those who lost their lives in battle, and a time of Thanksgiving for the cessation of hostilities in the European theater.

President Harry S. Truman set aside this coming Sunday as he asked all Americans to remember their war dead on this day.

In Klamath Falls churches tribute will be paid all men of this area who have laid down their lives in the present conflict.

Of the 142 Klamath basin men of the army, navy and marines, who have been reported lost since December 7, 1941, 45 paid the supreme sacrifice in the European and Mediterranean theaters of war.

Following is an unofficial list compiled by The Herald and News of this group for whom special prayers will be said Sunday:

- Pvt. Charles A. Hinson, U. S. army. Lost his life in the sinking of a transport in the North Atlantic, February 2, 1943. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Hinson, Langell valley.
- PFC Charles "Bob" Hamilton, 21, killed in action in Africa, May, 1943. This was the first casualty reported here as the result of the African campaign. Son of Mrs. George Lamb, Spring Lake district.
- Howard Ernest Grossen, ships cook 3/c. Seabees. Died of gunshot wounds in Africa August 17, 1943. Husband of Mrs. Hattie Grossen, formerly of 615 Martin.
- S/S Lloyd C. Barnes, 28, Henley. Killed in action in North Africa, July 26, 1943. Family now in Grants Pass.
- Cpl. Vernon Louisaunt, killed in action in Sicily, August 7, 1943. Son of Mrs. Dave Lister, 1945 Auburn.
- Pvt. Clarence W. Luce, 20, 81st reconnaissance squadron. Died of wounds received in Italy on January 13, 1944. His wife, Alice, lives at 4444 Boardman. Pvt. Luce was the son of L. E. Luce, 528 S. 5th.
- T/Sgt. Theodore Schatz, 26, U. S. army air corps. Killed in action over Germany in January, 1944. His wife, Charlotte, resides in this city.
- S/S John W. DeMille, U. S. army air corps. Killed in action over Sicily, May 10, 1943. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy M. DeMille, Ashland.
- S/S Orville Carmichael, 27, U. S. army air corps. Killed in action over England in March, 1944. Former resident of Malin.
- 2nd Lt. Charles H. Semon, U. S. army paratrooper, killed in action D-Day, June 6, 1944. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Semon of Henley.
- 1st Lt. Donald F. Turner, son of Mrs. Jack Hales, 1028 Homedale, killed in action D-Day, June 6, 1944. In France. Member of the U. S. army tank corps.
- Pvt. William F. Murray, U. S. army paratrooper, glider infantry, killed in France June 23, 1944. Son of Mrs. A. M. Murray, now of Delake, Calif.
- Sgt. Albert Werner, U. S. army, killed in action in Italy on June 8, 1944. Brother of Mrs. Douglas Freeberg, 225 East Main.
- S/Sgt. Alex Sundberg, 26, U. S. army air corps gunner, killed in action over Holland, March 26, 1944. Son of Nels Sundberg, 5950 Delaware.
- Sgt. Byron Bistine, 33, U. S. army infantry, killed in action in Italy, August 12, 1944. Son of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Bistine, 3346 Harlan drive.
- S/Sgt. Alfred D. Giles, 23, U. S. army tank battalion, armored division, killed in action in France August 17, 1944. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Darwin Giles, Chiloquin.
- PFC Tony Degeerlamoe, U. S. army, killed in action July 5, 1944, in Mediterranean area while serving with 368th infantry of the 81st division. Husband of Mrs. Evelyn Degeerlamoe, 4413 Freida.
- Pvt. Walter A. Bulck, U. S. army infantry, killed in action D-Day, June 6, 1944. In France. Son of Mr. and Mrs. K. O. Bulck, 3348 Homedale.
- Pvt. Ned Moss, 28, U. S. army, killed in action in France July 26, 1944. Son of Steve Moss of Ramona Apts., this city.
- Pvt. Arthur W. Bergquist, 37, U. S. army infantry, killed in action in France on July 26, 1944. Formerly of Bly.
- PFC Frank Arthur Cress, 23, U. S. army paratrooper, killed in action in Holland, September 28, 1944. Son of Mrs. Gladys Cress, 2943 Blisbee.
- U. S. army, killed in action in the European theater September 17, 1944. Son of Mrs. Oscar Pederson of this city.
- 2nd Lt. Robert Taber Leslie, 27, U. S. army air corps, killed in action over Italy October 1, 1944. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice G. Leslie, 811 Rose.
- Capt. Elie Reber, 21, killed in action in raid over Europe with U. S. army air corps, February, 1943. Son of Mr. and Mrs. John Reber, Malin.
- Pvt. Elmer M. Estes, 27, U. S. army air corps, killed in action in France, October 7, 1944. Son of Mrs. Anna Estes, 1019 McKinley.
- 1st Lt. James D. Wendel, U. S. army air corps, killed in plane crash October 9, 1944, in England. Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Wendel, 216 East Main.
- S/Sgt. Lawrence O. Griffin, U. S. army, killed in action in France, October 8, 1943. Son of L. Griffin of Bly.
- 1st Lt. Robert Bunnell, 25, U. S. army infantry, killed in Germany on October 9, 1944. Son of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Bunnell, now of Sandy, Ore.
- T/Sgt. Harry D. Pollock, U. S. army, killed in action in Germany October 9, 1944. Son of Mrs. Mary Moteschenbacher, 9941 Blisbee.
- 1st Lt. Emil Potucek, 26, U. S. army, died in a German prison camp after having been reported missing October 17, 1944. Son of Mrs. Anna Potucek, Malin.
- Pvt. Lorenzo Stallard, 30, killed in action in Belgium, December 26, 1944. His wife, Marjorie, resides at 4762 S. 6th.
- Sgt. John Arnold, U. S. army infantry, killed in action in France in January, 1945. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Arnold, 1435 Oregon.
- Cpl. Harry Fenning, U. S. army, killed in action in France January 15, 1945. His wife, Eleanor, resides at 4144 Washburn way.
- Sgt. Howard E. Crews, 33, U. S. army infantry, killed in Luxembourg.
- S/Sgt. George Carnes, 25, U. S. army infantry, killed in action in Belgium January 20, 1945. Son of Mrs. Elizabeth Carnes of this city.
- PFC Dale Dunham, U. S. army infantry, killed in action in Italy February 28, 1945. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Dunham, 438 Oak.

LOS ANGELES, May 10 (AP) After a lapse of 12 years an elderly Roseburg, Ore., couple just released from a Philippines prison camp was reunited today with a son returned from long army duty in Alaska.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Kidder, smiled happily as the son, Major Robert Kidder, strode into their hotel here. With him was the bride he married in Port Richardson, Alaska, last March. She was the former Julia Wahoyiak, army civilian employe, whom he met during his 38 months' service in the north.

"I'm so happy to see Robert after 12 long years," the mother said. "Now if I only can see James."
