under adhesive tape in his cigarette case.
That solves one problem.

IN London today, one of these "highly reliable sources" (meaning a higher-up in the know who can't let his name be used) estimates that between 4,000,000 and 6,000,000 Germans may be forced to "atone for their nation's atrocities" if the proposed plan of pool punishment is adopted by the victorious powers.

That will give you some idea of the magnitude of the task we face there.

STALIN today sends messages to Churchill and Truman, adding his congratulations on the surrender of Nazi Germany and declaring: "The joint struggle of Soviet, American and British armies against the German invader will go down in history as an example of the fighting collaboration of our peoples."

That doesn't sound like the double-cross, does it?

IN trying to understand Stalin (admittedly not an easy task) we must remember the long years in which Russia was an international outcast and pariah, with no British or American politician having anything but evil to speak of her and the common run of us thinking of all Russians as whiskered and booted conspirators carrying a bomb in every pocket.

The Russians were angrily aware of this at the time, and it isn't at all surprising that they remember it now. Nor is it surprising that their present conduct may be affected by the suspicions that were aroused in those years.

WHEN you were fighting your own way up the ladder, you may have been snubbed by snooty neighbors. If so, you REMEMBERED it when you became somebody, and governed yourself accordingly.

Let's grant the Russians the right to the same quiet human and understandable attitude.

WE get a brief glimpse today of what WE'RE going to do in that part of Germany that will be under American occupation.

There will be a MILITARY government, under General Lucius Clay, a West Pointer. It will include a special intelligence section to detect and RUTHLESSLY SUPPRESS any Nazi underground activities.

In fact, we've coined a new word to cover the situation. Germany is to be "DENAZIFIED."

THERE will be a public information section to "control ALL FORMS OF PUBLIC EXPRESSION in Germany, including newspapers, radio, magazines and other publications and motion pictures."

We're going in for COUNTER-indoctrination, you see—which is probably the only way to handle the job of "denazifying" the Germans.

The situation in Germany is extraordinary, and extraordinary situations call for heroic measures.

But let's remind ourselves NOW that this business of CONTROLLING ALL FORMS OF PUBLIC EXPRESSION is a dangerous tool. Let's make very sure that it shall NEVER be used on the HOME front.

Long-Based Blows

A drive to oust the Japanese from Malaya would compare with other operations in the Pacific which have been launched from bases 400 to 600 miles away from the objectives.

Trincomalee, the British naval base in Ceylon, is 600 miles across the Bay of Bengal from Sumatra, which lies between India and Singapore. Yet Trincomalee is the only suitable harbor on the eastern coast of India where the major elements of an amphibious expedition could be assembled. Even Rangoon offers little help, for it is a port far up a badly-silted river.

There is a genuine prospect, however, that operations elsewhere in the Pacific may advance so fast that British forces will be able to walk into Singapore unopposed. Certainly, Japanese forces in Burma are giving evidences of demoralization and disorganization and they have lost a great bulk of their heavy equipment.

WMC Outlines Worker Plans

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—The war manpower commission today outlined plans for a gradual easing of controls over workers "as rapidly as circumstances permit."

But, Chairman Paul V. McNutt said, general relaxations must await Japan's defeat.

First effects of a so-called "transitional post-V-E Day program" will be felt in areas where manpower is adequate.

SEATTLE, May 11 (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. Shigeo Nagaiishi returned home with their three little children from the Hunt, Idaho, relocation center, to find their Walker street house scrawled with these greetings in red paint:

"No Japs Wanted Here!"

"Beware!"

"Death!"

Said Mrs. Nagaiishi today:

"I am afraid. It was that awful 'skeleton' out there that sent a shudder through me. We thought we were brave enough to come home and face things—but I don't know."

The "skeleton" is a bright red skull-and-crossbones painted on the second step leading into their home.

All the garage windows were smashed and their automobile put out of commission last night.

"We managed to buy some groceries from a Chinese store," said the mother, "but at another grocery store, when my husband tried to buy a moon, they wouldn't sell it to him."

Negotiations For Plane Building Set

SEATTLE, May 11 (AP)—Negotiations are underway between the Boeing Aircraft company and the nation's airlines for manufacture of the Stratocruiser and the C-97 military transport airplane. C. L. Egtvedt, company chairman, said last night.

He added, however, that production of the B-29 Superfortress will remain the company's "first and foremost project as long as it serves the national interest."

against an aggressor should be permitted a voice in the council's decision to take forceful action. Mexico and New Zealand endorsed this idea and Australia and several others are backing the principle.

2. New Zealand suggested that the proposed world assembly of nations—to which the Dumbarton Oaks plan would assign little authority—should have the right to approve or reject any security council action. This is bluntly opposed by the big powers.

Decision Delayed

3. A Cuban proposition that the security council be enlarged from 11 member nations, provided under Dumbarton Oaks, to 14 or 15, was debated in the committee on the council yesterday but a decision was delayed pending further study.

The same general issue of the council's powers was tied into the behind-the-scenes dispute over regional security arrangements which has split the United States delegation down the middle.

Henlein Takes Life In Prison

WITH U. S. THIRD ARMY IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA, May 11 (AP)—Konrad Henlein, who before the war delivered the Sudetenland to Hitler, died yesterday a suicide in a war prison camp.

It was reported at an American corps headquarters that Henlein slashed his wrists with a razor blade concealed under adhesive tape in a cigarette case.

By taking his own life Henlein escaped execution by the Czechoslovak government. He had been sentenced to death in absentia by a Czechoslovak court in 1938.

Payrolls Gain \$7 Million In April

SALEM, May 11 (AP)—Industrial payrolls covered by the state industrial accident commission totaled \$52,051,683 during April, a gain of \$7,400,000 over the preceding month, and \$3,000,000 more than in April 1944, the commission said today.

Payrolls for Multnomah county totaled \$36,969,891 last month, a gain of \$5,300,000 over the preceding month, and \$2,200,000 more than in April 1944.

BOWLES PLEDGES '42 RETAIL PRICE

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP) Price Administrator Chester Bowles today pledged 1942 retail prices for most reconversion commodities.

Outlining OPA's pricing policies for long-scarce consumer goods, Bowles told a news conference:

"Everything we do in OPA must be directed toward making it possible for American enterprise and skills to produce a record volume of high quality goods at low prices and high wages."

"Nothing will more surely smother the fires of inflation than an avalanche of civilian goods and services."

Bowles said it is his belief that there will be "few instances in which increases in retail prices above 1942 levels will be necessary, and in such instances the size of the increases will be relatively small."
