

OPponents OF DAM GAIN ONE VOTE MARGIN

SACRAMENTO, May 11 (AP)—Shasta county opponents of Iron Canyon dam held at least a temporary advantage in the senate proxy by the margin of a single vote today but the battle which has raged since the dam's location in northern California counties was slated to be fought all over again.

After a warning by Senator William P. Rich, Marysville, that local disputes and sectional arguments might be jeopardizing the federal government's allocation of \$450,000,000 to California, chief for postwar flood control, the senate voted 18 to 17 for a "reservation" clause in the bill for state cooperation in the federal program.

Championed by Senator Oliver Carter, Redding, the amendment provides that nothing in the proposed act shall be construed as constituting state approval of the government's proposal to build either Iron Canyon or the Table Mountain dam.

Rich gave notice he will move to reconsider the vote.

Meanwhile the assembly got down to consideration of budgetary expenditures after a detailed explanation of Governor Warren's \$883,000,000 bill for state support the next biennium by Assemblyman Albert C. Wollenberg, San Francisco.

Wollenberg declared the state finance department had already trimmed \$20,000,000 from requests of departmental heads and that the ways and means committee therefore found no water to squeeze out of the bill. Instead, he said "adjustments" had upped the bill slightly more than \$71,000 but that administrative controls had been devised which should save \$20,000,000 in departmental expenditures.

The gunner's wife, Melva, and 7-year-old son Jerry, are living at San Bernardino. Mrs. Hamilton was the first to receive word that her husband was located but details were not given.
