

UMBER NEEDS SHOULD AFFECT VACATION PLAN

Military requirements for lumber continue to be urgent, and vacation plans in the industry should be made with this in mind, workers said today by F. H. Wagoner, western log and lumber administrator, in a statement to Klamath unions and management.

Wagoner said that there should be no vacation in the woods except in a few special cases where conditions have been continuous a year or longer.

In all cases where management and unions agree that vacation should be made in lieu of wages, applications should be submitted to the west coast lumber commission, Brundage said.

Wagoner said that the position of lumber is such that it is a recognized right where employees are covered and will not be relinquished.

Wagoner urged unions and management to work out vacation plans or provide for payment of wages in lieu of vacation in accordance with the urgency of the production situation.

SNOW MELTING ON ROADS TO CRATER LAKE

Snow is melting fast on the Crater Lake road, Thomas C. Parker, assistant park superintendent, reported after a survey with Ranger Bob Briscoe on road conditions Thursday.

Recent warm weather has made the drifts unusually soft at this time of year, Parker said, enabling them to progress about four miles into the park through the south entrance.

Since the war, the government has restricted snow-plowing except when the main crust of the snow has melted and only occasional drifts remain along the roadway. At present the drifts are too heavy and there is too much snow to start plowing, but Parker is hopeful conditions will be such that work may be started within the next week.

The park may then be reached from highway 97 from Medford, through Union creek.

Roads to the lake may be opened by June 1, Parker surmised, but there is still plenty of snow on the roads west of the lake and they probably won't be opened until the first week in July.

Marine Vet Placed On Probation

W. H. Gardner, 23-year-old discharged marine veteran, was placed on one-year probation Thursday morning when he appeared before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses.

TAX ON PUNCHBOARDS

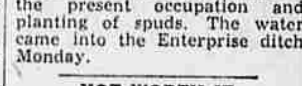
ALBANY, May 11 (AP)—A 2 1/2 per cent tax on punchboard income is expected to finance Albany's recreation program this year.

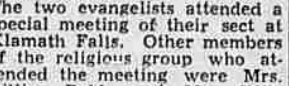
