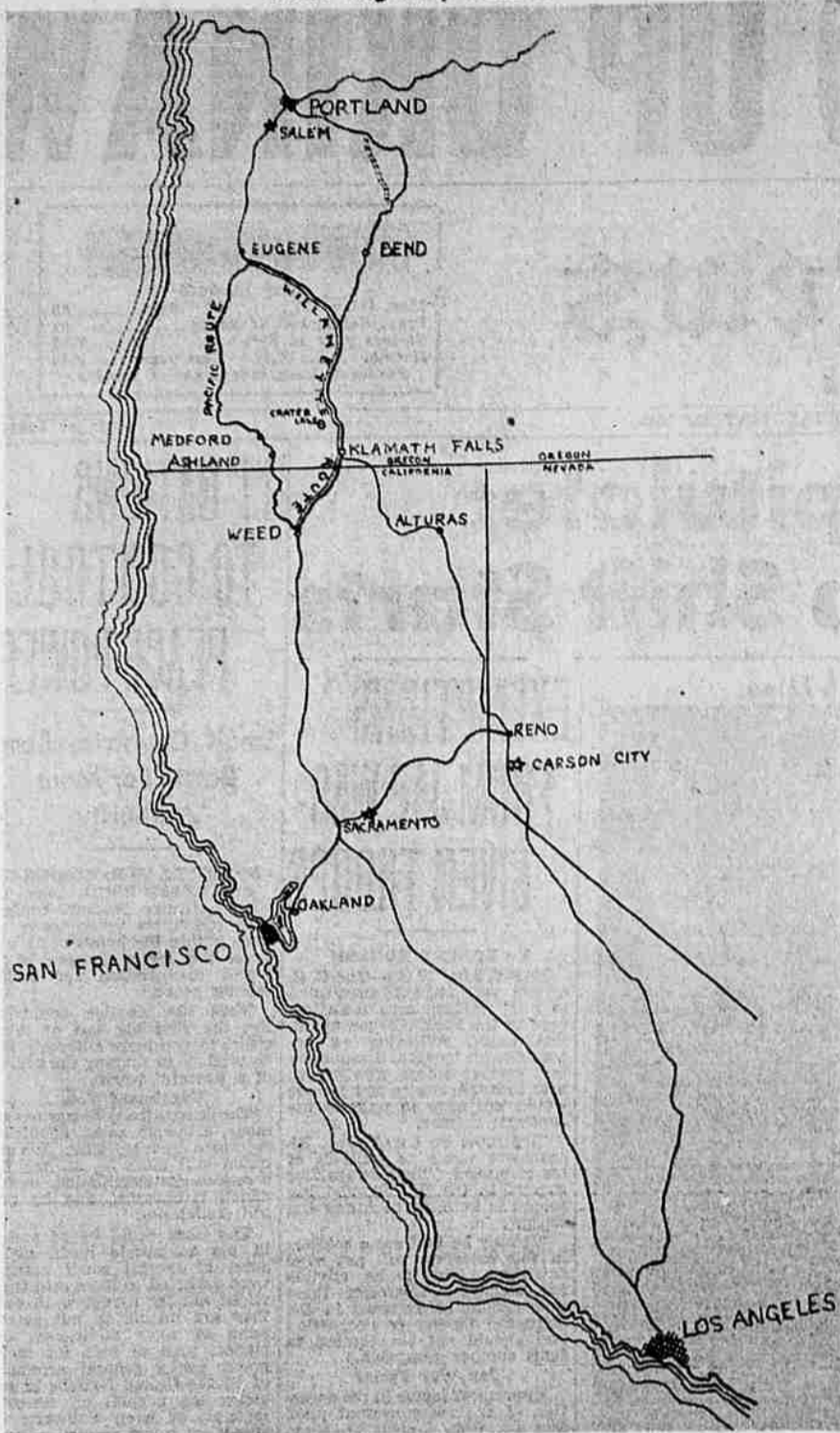


Coast Highway Pattern

formation seeking to refute Schupp's assertions. Meanwhile, the Klamath chamber of commerce roads committee has been busy for many weeks, and has prepared a brief in support of the Willamette route designation.

Supports Route Robert W. Sawyer, editor of the Bend Bulletin and a former highway commissioner, supports the Willamette route, and Bend generally is behind this project. So also is Lakeview, Tulelake, Alturas, Reno, and numerous other points off the route, as well as those upon it.

Going from here to the meeting will be Tom Watters, chairman of the highway committee; Charles Stark, manager of the chamber of commerce; A. D. Collier, member of the city planning commission and the highway committee; Malcolm Epley, managing editor of The Herald and News, and others. B. K. Snyder of Lakeview, chairman of the house roads committee in the legislature; Sawyer, of Bend, and William Niskanen of the city, and others will be on hand in behalf of the Willamette route.

Eugene Neutral Eugene, on the junction of the two routes, is reported neutral. There have been confused reports about Portland's attitude. A. R. Trombley, Portland chamber roads chairman, was quoted in the Medford Mail-Tribune as saying his group favored the Pacific route.

Frank McCaslin, president of the Portland chamber, in answer to an inquiry from The Herald and News, wired as follows: "True Trombley sat in at Medford meeting. Portland chamber wants both roads built to high standards. Present disposition is to remain neutral regarding designation and leave that question to the local communities."

Lines of German Prisoners Head Toward Red Lines

MOSCOW, May 12 (AP)—Long lines of German prisoners moved toward the soviet union from every sector of the front today, headed for reception centers where they will be classified according to occupations. The total of prisoners taken between Wednesday and Friday has risen to the neighborhood of 800,000.

Congressmen Urge Opening Of Mines

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—Thirty-one western congressmen yesterday urged War Production Board Chairman J. A. Krug to allow the nation's gold mines to reopen. Their joint letter, declaring that no other industry has been inflicted with such hardships, was made public by Rep. Engle (D-Calif.). They included Bartlett (D-Alaska), Stockman and Ellsworth (R-Ore.).

Japs to Pray On New Crisis

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12 (AP)—Radio Tokyo, after a day of unconfirmed claims of damage to American ships in Okinawa waters, and of savage, spear-wielding Indonesian "volunteer" aid on Tarakan island off Borneo, gave notice of a national prayer meeting for "tiding over the crisis." Continuing its home-consumption battle claims, radio Tokyo said in a broadcast intercepted by the federal communications commission, that Japanese sea units yesterday sank two ships of unidentified category and damaged an American carrier. Delacy Says Press Prints Scare Stories

SEATTLE, May 12 (AP)—Rep. Hugh Delacy (D-Wash.) declared last night that U. S. newspapers are "trying deliberately to throw up a scare (by) trying to show that one nation or another is out of step at the (United Nations) conference." Speaking at a meeting sponsored by the King county democratic central committee, Delacy added that "Russia is the chief target. . . . But I don't think the conference will break up." Before the meeting, the congressman said he had been advised by the war shipping administration that Pacific coast ports soon would be "jammed with all types of shipping" because of the expected acceleration of the Pacific war.

bombs and shells. The Russians are now recovering the drowned bodies. . . . THE 400,000-odd Germans in Norway appear to be quietly surrendering and awaiting their return to Germany. Quisling's police chief and his police minister are said to have killed themselves rather than face the Norwegian patriots. It isn't too hard to understand. Suppose the Japs had taken the Pacific Coast and some of our scum had JOINED the rest of us. What we'd have done to them when we got the upper hand again wouldn't be pretty to see. . . . THERE is a new Russian scare. Reports published in London today say that Stalin has written Churchill that the Yalta pledges have been BROKEN and that further co-operation is impossible. British and American officials refuse comment. The rumor is out that Churchill and Truman are planning a meeting. . . . YOU'D better just keep your fingers crossed and hope for the best. Stalin is admittedly hard to peg. But he must know that unless Russia, Britain and the United States get along together SOMEHOW the world of the future will be ALL DARK, with no rosier, softer lights. It's hard to believe that the Russians don't want peace after all they've suffered. . . . ALL Europe today is a powder keg of unreasoning, bitter hatreds, with matches scattered all around. Example: General Stack, of our 36th division, is said to have SHAKEN HANDS with Goering after he was captured. (We Americans are an odd breed of sportsmen, and it MIGHT have happened.) But the report ANGERS the British. The London News Chronicle says in a hot editorial: "Once and for all, Goering is an evil, cruel murderer to whom justice must be done. Because he is fat, he is not a king. Because he laughs, he is not merciful. By his record, he is a criminal." . . . NERVES, you see, are rasped so raw after all these years of horror that even the British, who have traditionally prided themselves upon what we (possibly foolish) Anglo-Saxons call "sportmanship," flare up hotly at us over the mere report of a handshaking with a captured enemy. (Stack was wrong, of course, if he did it. There are hands that are too bloody to be shaken. But men do strange things under the stress of battle.) . . . IF you can, you'd better kneel by your bed each night and offer up this prayer: "Dear God, give to us who are the victors MEN AS LEADERS who have the vision, the balance, the courage and the stamina to lead us WISELY through these dangerous hours of bitterness and hatred and temptation." . . . BIRTH OFFICE CLOSED The register office at Richmond, Eng., was closed just a few years ago. The birth of the former Prince of Wales at White Lodge, Richmond Park, was registered at this office.

Break With Reds Reported Rumor

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—Acting Secretary of State Joseph Grew said today he had no knowledge of any communication from Marshal Stalin to the effect that cooperation with the western allies had become impossible. He voiced the disclaimer in response to questions about published reports that Stalin had written Premier Churchill, with a copy to President Truman, that the Yalta agreement had been broken and that he believed it futile to discuss the Polish problem further. It was learned meanwhile that the soviet government has not replied to the request of Secretary of State Stettinius and Foreign Secretary Eden in San Francisco that Russia furnish information regarding the arrest in Moscow of 16 former Polish underground leaders.

WARNINGS DISPLAYED SAN FRANCISCO, May 12 (AP)—Southeast storm warnings were displayed at 2 a. m. today along the Pacific coast from Tatoosh Island, Wash., to Cape Mendocino, Calif., for southerly winds of strong to gale force, the weather bureau here reported. Small craft warnings were posted at 2 a. m. from Cape Mendocino to Point Reyes.

Record Pine Drive Underway In Idaho

PRIEST RIVER, Ida., May 12 (AP)—Described as probably the largest in the nation this year, a drive of white and yellow pine logs got underway yesterday in the Priest river area. The logs will be driven miles down Priest river to the lake to the Pend Oreille at Diamond Match company mill at Alben Falls and Coeur d'Alene. The drive will last about six weeks. Jack Barrow, logging and timber superintendent, said.
