Grant, Jefferson Place Most Men As Meet Gets Underway; Pelicans Qualify In Five

Corvallis and Washington of Portland qualified in six events; Klamath Falls, Roseburg and Ashland, five each; Salem, Scappoose and Milwaukie, four each. Finals opened today with contestants from 44 high schools.

Individual honors in qualifying events went to Dave Henthorne, Klamath Falls, who made good in the 100-yard dash, quarter mile, broad jump, and relay. Lyle Schlavin of Jefferson—defending champion—qualified in the 100, 400 and relay. Scappoose titleholder Bob Anderson hurled the discus 151 feet 8 1/2 inches—not far behind his own record of 153 feet 3 1/2 inches.

Champs Find Going Tough In National

Brooklyn Southpaws Catch St. Louis Twice; Giant Win Streak Forecasts Trouble

St. Louis was finding the going tough in the National league's eastern half today as the suspicion grew that serious trouble was ahead for the world champions.

Not that two successive ambushes by Brooklyn southpaws were going to give Skipper Billy Southworth sleepless nights. Marty Marion was still out of the lineup and the outfield was a patchwork proposition due to the injury to Red Schoendienst.

However, six straight victories by the New York Giants, two against western opposition, could be a real storm signal and the Brooks' six-game string couldn't be ignored.

The Cards murdered the Dodgers 18 out of 22 games last year and romped over the Giants 18-6, but it was a safe bet there would be no repeat performance this summer.

Brooklyn's hot streak was the talk of the majors because the "experts" had labeled the Bums cellar bait and even Branch Rickey and Leo Durocher must be amazed.

Durocher had the nerve to start Tom Seaver, a 25-game winner at San Francisco but a failure in two Dodger appearances and it paid off with interest. The 32-year-old lefthander had been belted out by the Giants and Phils but he shut out the Cardinals, 7-0, on seven hits for his first major league home run off loser Ted Wilks, a three-time victor over the Brooks in '44, and Second Baseman Eddie Stanky finally made an error after handling 89 chances flawlessly.

Johnny Rucker's 18-game hit streak was snapped by Frank Dasso of Cincinnati but Phil Weintraub clouted one into the upper stands with two on in the eighth for the Giants' 4-3 margin.

Although Van (The New) Mungo failed to last for the fourth straight time, Ace Adam saved him a second decision. Weintraub's clout tied him with Mel Ott and Ernie Lombardi for the league lead with five.

Joe McCarthy shook up his batting order in Detroit, inserting Tuck Stainback in Russ Derry's right field post, and watched his New York Yankees even the series with Detroit, 7-3. Hank Borowy notched his fifth victory over Hal Newhouse who topped the Yanks six times a year ago. Stainback celebrated his return to the lineup with his first circuit clout in four years.

Russ Christopher also hung up win No. 5 for the Philadelphia A's on a 5-2 job against Chicago whose hold on first place slipped to only 20 percentage points over New York. George Kell, who had never hit a big league homer, connected twice, accounting for three runs off Ed Lopat.

Four runs in the ninth clinched a 7-1 verdict for the Chicago Cubs' Hank Wyse over the Phils who used four hurlers. Rookie Charley Sproull was the loser. Despite Vince DiMaggio's fourth round-tripper.

Pete Fox and Lloyd Christopher each clubbed three hits to help Rex Cecil and the Boston Red Sox drub Cleveland, 8-4, and St. Louis and Washington played a 1-1 tie called after 10 innings to permit the Senators to make train connections for Chicago. Tex Shirley and Roger Wolff each allowed eight hits.

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Wagner Lays Out Morelli In Armory Grudge Fight

A dressing room battle carried to the ring ended disastrously for Tough Tony Morelli in the Klamath armory last night when Gorgeous George Wagner, the ladies' heartthrob, pounded him into bloody insensibility for the final two falls.

Originally Promoter Mack Lillard had carded Wagner and Sneez Achiu, the Chinese sleeper artist, for the main event, but the grudge fight in the dressing room during the opener gave Lillard the opportunity to stage a real blood and thunder event in the ring.

Morelli took the first fall after pounding Wagner blindly around the ring before the bell sounded and then falling on him in a moment of weakness for the three-count. George came back in the second round to batter Morelli into insensibility and claim the fall with a body press, much to the delight of the ladies.

During the rest period, Wagner, not satisfied with just getting the fall, picked up the stool in Morelli's corner and started an advance toward Morelli with murder in his mind. Referee Wally Moss interceded and finally succeeded in wresting the weapon from Gorgeous George and put the proceedings back on an even keel.

In the final stanza, George reopened the fresh cut above Morelli's eye and hammered him into a bloody coma for the fall. Morelli was not satisfied with just being kayoed, but wanted to continue the row after the match was over. Wagner gave quite a demonstration of willingness to cooperate in murder, but finally the ref cleared the ring. Witnesses said the battle continued in the dressing room.

The middle bout was a clean affair with Paavo Katonen and Sneez Achiu splitting the falls to make a draw. Achiu's pressure pointing holds irritated Katonen, but both wrestlers kept the match on a high plane. Paavo took his fall in the third round by a reverse body press following a grand melee in which Sneez was the aggressor. Achiu got his half of the draw in the last round by a body turnover after many slams.

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Ducks Hike Coast Ball League Lead

Dumler Foiled In Attempt To Win Third Straight Go For Fourth Place Padres

Carl Dumler, San Diego right-hander who led all Pacific Coast league hurlers last week with eight wins and no defeats, was foiled last night in his third consecutive quest of victory No. 9. His defeat by Portland increased the Beavers' loop lead to four and a half games and dropped the Padres from third to fourth place.

Seattle and Sacramento battled for 13 hectic innings before the game was called due to a ban on starting an inning after 11:40 p. m. The tie contest was the circuit's first of the season. Oakland moved back into third with a win over Los Angeles, while San Francisco wall-popped Hollywood the fourth time in a row to gain a sixth place tie with the Angels.

Dumler, in losing 2-1, saw his Padre teammates fail to capitalize on 11 base hits while he

was holding the Beavers to six. Portland counted both its runs in the seventh frame, being aided by Tony Criscola's error on Frank Demaree's hit which brought in the second and winning tally.

The 9-9 Rainier-Solon tie came after both teams had registered big late inning rallies. Sacramento took a 9-4 lead in the last of the eighth scoring six runs, only to have Seattle knot it up with a five-run outburst in the first of the ninth. Chuck Leno, third baseman, climaxed the Rainier attack with a three-run homer over the leftfield wall, his second of the game.

Oakland evened its series at two all with Los Angeles by its 8-3 victory. Four Angel pitchers gave up 14 hits while Garth Mann was holding last year's champions to six.

San Francisco's 9-1 victory over Hollywood was clinched in the second inning when the Seals pounded in five runs off Pitcher Ronnie Smith. Emil Mailho's home run inside the park accounted for three of the scores.
