

ICKES URGES CUTBACK IN METAL DEAL

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes urged today that the government cut back the aluminum contract with Canada and utilize domestic facilities to their fullest extent.

Ickes told a senate sub-committee on small business investigating the aluminum situation that:

1—He questioned the "wisdom" of the original contract with the Aluminum Corporation of Canada.

2—Other government agencies gave top priority to output of aluminum in Canada while there was "delay" in marshalling the facilities available here.

3—As a result of delays in the program, Ickes said, "this country failed to produce during 1941 and 1942 more aluminum than was obtained from the Canadians. These delays were not reasonable."

4—He said the great power projects in the northwest will make this section of the U. S. the world leader in light metal production but meanwhile:

"We are confronted with the question of what to do about the latest contract to buy 250 million pounds more of Canadian aluminum and what to do about the government aluminum plants."

5—"I urge that the Canadian contract be cancelled at least partly and that the government plants be used to produce the same metal so long as the hydro power is available."

Accused Habitual Criminal Escapes

LA GRANDE, Ore., May 14 (AP)—George W. Durham held here for trial as a habitual criminal escaped from the Union county jail here early Sunday, District Attorney Colon R. Eberhard said yesterday.

Eberhard said the prisoner managed in a still unexplained manner to unlock his cell door, then dug through a brick wall into the county treasurer's office to freedom.

Durham, he said, had escaped earlier this year from the Oregon state penitentiary, but was apprehended near Hot Lake and convicted on a pistol carrying charge.

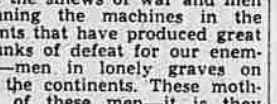
With the war, on one front at least, pretty thoroughly won, there come up, more and more, discussions as to who won it—what influence was the greatest toward its winning.

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620 MARINES END TRAINING COURSES HERE

Six hundred and 20 marines have completed courses in the training program which started in July 1944, at Klamath Union high school, the only course of its kind in the United States.

Here supplemental and brush-up courses, as well as apprenticeship courses, are given in a rehabilitation training service open to all returned veterans.

ROSEBURG, May 14 (AP)—The state director of fisheries has urged Douglas county to carefully consider fish life before approving projected dams on the Umpqua river.

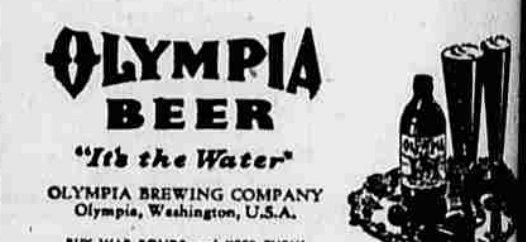

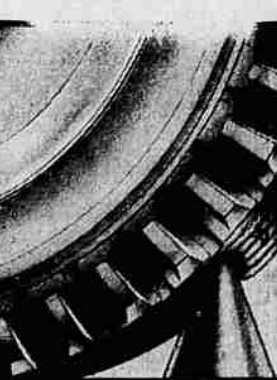
